II. Background of the College with Vision, Mission and Objectives

Khalsa College Amritsar is a historic institution of higher education situated in Northern India. It was established on 5th March, 1892 A.D. with the main objective to spread the benefits of modern education in Humanities, Agriculture, Science and Technology amongst the people of Punjab. During the past 127 years, Khalsa College has set new milestones, scaled new heights and influenced not only the destiny of the people of Punjab but also played its fore-ordained role in shaping the history of the nation.

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Khalsa College Amritsar is the first autonomous college of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. It was bestowed with the status of "College with Potential for Excellence" by UGC in the year 2006. The college was selected under "Star College Scheme" by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India in March 2009. The college was also given grant under 'FIST Programme' by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India in July 2009. The college was accredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC during the first accreditation in 2003. The college also got A Grade in second cycle with 3.41 CGPA in 2011. The college has been reaccredited in 3rd cycle with A' Grade (3.47 CGPA) in 2017.

The eco-friendly campus of the college covers an area of over 300 acres and provides the best infrastructure required for higher education. The college has 210 class rooms, 80 laboratories for UG and PG students, 17 ICT rooms, a spacious auditorium-cum-conference hall, 2 seminar halls equipped with audio visual facilities and a central library building. It has 5 boys' hostels and 3 girls' hostels which provide accommodation to 992 resident students. The campus also has a Gurudwara Sahib, Gymnasium, Dispensary (with First Aid, Inpatient, Outpatient, Ambulance and Emergency Care Facility), 65 acres Agriculture Farm, Dairy Farm, 30 acres Student Farm in addition to Farmer Training Centre, Organic Vegetable Farm, Botanical Garden, Swimming Pool, Nursery, Fruit Orchid, Cricket Stadium, well maintained sprawling Play Grounds (Hockey, Football, Basketball and 400 meters Athletics Track), Career Guidance Cell, Placement Cell, Student Activity Centre, Vocational Training Centre, Girls' Common Room, branches of two banks with two ATMs and one e-Lobby for banking services. The college has one central library and 15 departmental libraries. The central library has a collection of about 1.96 lakbs books

Sikh History Research Department was started under the leadership of Dr. Ganda Singh, a renowned Sikh historian and it developed into a Major Research Centre. It has a rich collection of documents related to history of Sikh religion and philosophy. It houses a reference library and a gallery of thousands of manuscripts, rare books, portraits and paintings of great historical significance and value. The museum has a collection of 415 Photographs/paintings, 601 manuscripts, 380 newspapers files (1904–1988), 90 newspapers clipping files and 35 magazines. Out of 6,416 books in the Sikh History Research Department, more than 500 books are a century old. There are a large number of paintings, photographs and weapons of 17th and 18th century. Research scholars in the fields of Punjabi literature, Sikh history and Religious studies from India and abroad use the valuable information from the department. The management has completed the laudable work of digitalization of manuscripts, books and old data of the department.

At present, the college has 321 teaching staff on rolls, out of which 32 are Associate Professors, 130 are Ph.D., 40 M.Phil., 151 PGs and the strength of non-teaching staff stands at 161 members. The student strength has considerably increased over the years from 3941 in 2012-13 to 6098 in 2018-19.

The college offers 4 M.Phil. courses, 26 P.G. courses, 22 U.G. courses, 3 P.G. Diplomas, 6 U.G. Diplomas, one certificate course and two Add on courses. The college has certificate course in Cutting, Stitching, Embroidery and Food Preservation for the poor and needy women free of cost and free classes for the underprivileged children as part of the Community Services Programme of the college.

Khalsa College enjoys coveted status in sports. It has produced several Olympians, International, National and State level champions. The college today stands in all its brilliance and radiance in sports accomplishment. It won overall general championship trophy in men section by securing 29368 points in Inter College/Inter University/National Tournaments. 131 players from different games participated in all India Inter University and National level Tournaments and they bagged 53 Gold, 45 Silver and 55 Bronze Medals.

Department of Youth Welfare & Cultural Activities of the college provides platform to the students to present their talent in various cultural activities. It has played a significant role in preserving and promoting the rich cultural heritage of Punjab. The college prides in producing artists of National and International fame in Theatre, Film TV and Music.

The four units of NSS and three wings of NCC under their respective Co-ordinators aim at inculcating the spirit of social service among students, sensitizing them towards nation building welfare activities

Implementation of e-governance in the college has improved efficiency in administrative work and expatiated services like enrolment, examination, results, e-lectures etc. It has empowered students and faculty, thus encouraging their participation in governance.

Khalsa College is committed to preserve its rich history and cultural heritage and making it a place of learning that would strive towards ever higher degree of excellence in the development of the mind and spirit.

The college student enrolment, profile and admission process for various courses is transparent to all stakeholders and it is done through advertisement in print and electronic media. There is three tier admission process.

The college admits students on the basis of entrance test, merit and on first come first serve basis. The admission tests are conducted as per UGC guidelines with full transparency. The students have multiple choices to select a specific course offered by the college. The criteria for the selection of the students on entrance test basis include objective multiple choice based questions, interview and counselling whereas the selection of students on merit basis and first come first serve basis is through interview and counselling. The college reviews periodically its enrolment profile and the outcomes are used for improvement of the process. There is an upward trend in the number of admissions in the last five years. The total number of students admitted in 2018-19 was 6098 as compared to 3941 admitted in 2012-13.

TEACHING AND LEARNING METHODS

The college promotes quality education and has developed teaching learning and evaluation process according to the changing global needs of society and in consonance with the vision and mission of the institution. The teaching and learning process is self-analysed and introspected from time to time. The institution stands committed to make teaching and learning 'Student Centric', so as to make the students think, analyse, be independent, original and creative.

The total number of students admitted in 2018-19 is 6098 as compared to 3941 admitted in 2012-13. The college periodically reviews its enrolment profile and the outcomes are used for improvement of the process. There is an upward trend in the number of admissions in the last five years.

The college adopts learner centric teaching methods. The academic growth of differently-abled students is also analysed and remedial/special classes for needy students and slow learners are arranged. Advanced learners are offered enrichment courses. The team of well qualified, experienced and devoted teachers reflects the strength of the institution. At present, out of 321 teachers, 130 are Ph.D. and 40 are M.Phil. The college encourages the participation of its teachers in faculty development programmes.

Khalsa College Amritsar is a leading educational institution of North India and the first autonomous college of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. The autonomous status conferred in May 2013, offered the college an opportunity to bring innovation in curriculum development, governance, teaching, learning, research, evaluation and extension services.

(i) Curriculum Development

The college has designed new courses at Under-graduate and Post-graduate and Research levels in tune with the

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The college lays special emphasis on designing academic calendar by the start of every academic year The planning includes organization seminars/workshops/extended lectures and industrial visits to bring about an overall development of the students.

(ii) Examination

The students are continuously evaluated through tests, assignments, quizzes, seminars and semester/final examinations. The performance of the students is displayed on notice boards as well as on website of the college.

(iii) Credit System. At present percentage system is being followed in all the courses according to affiliating University rules. The credit system is under consideration.

(iv) Infrastructure

New wings/blocks have been created.

- The college has 210 classrooms, 80 labs, 9 computers lab, 15 research lab, 17 ICT rooms, 4 seminar halls, 1 main hall, 1 botanical garden, health centre and farmer training centre.
- > The college has 5 boys hostels and 3 girls hostels with a present occupancy of 992 students.
- > The college has Career Counselling Cell, Placement Cell and Language Laboratory.
- The college has a well-equipped department of Physical Education, play grounds such as hockey, football, basketball and cricket grounds, swimming pool, 400 metres athletic track in addition to the gymnasium to provide sports facilities and recognize and nurture sporting talent.
- The college has a heritage hall with a seating capacity of 600 persons in addition to two seminars cum conference halls with state-of-the-art audio visual and performance facilities.

(v) Governance

- The college administration runs through the various academic bodies constituted as per the UGC guidelines. The Board of Studies of various departments send their recommendations to the Academic Council, which in turn sends the approved items of their meetings for final approval in the Governing Body. The decentralized governance system of college consists of Principal as Head of the institution, Dean Academic Affairs, Deans of Faculties, Registrar, Controller of Examination, Heads/Incharges of various departments and teaching staff.
- As per guidelines of Autonomous colleges, University teachers/nominees of the affiliating university are members of Boards of Studies of the college, their valuable suggestions are duly considered in redesigning of the syllabi of the respective departments. The Vice-Chancellor's nominees being members of College Academic Council and Governing Body also guide the administration.
- Meetings of all Statutory Bodies are conducted at stipulated intervals.

Introduction of new courses: A large number of new courses have been started after the conferment of autonomous status. Some of these include M.Phil. (Punjabi, English, Political Science, Commerce), M.Sc. (Vegetable Science, Soil Science, Entomology, Pharmaceuticals, Food Science & Technology, Bio-Technology,

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Fashion Designing), M.A. (Performing Arts, Fine Arts, History, Journalism and Mass Communication), B.A. (Journalism & Mass Communication, Fashion Designing, Social Science), B.Com. (Hons.), B.Sc.(Hons.) in Physics, Chemistry, English, Punjabi and seven new subjects in Agriculture have been introduced.

Increase in the student intake: The student strength has considerably increased over the years from 3941 in 2012-13 to 6098 in 2018-19.

- The college regularly organizes conferences, seminars, workshops and guest lectures. More than 150 seminars/workshops/conferences were organized in the last five years. (Annexure- X C)
- Two research journals, with ISSN registration have been started by the college. Besides a centralized research centre, two research centres are established in the Departments of Agriculture and Commerce & Business Administration.
- Faculty members have published nearly 973 research papers in peer reviewed/reputed journals, 142 books with ISBN No., 37 chapters in books and 13 edited books in the last five years. The impact factors of the journals range from 0.04 to 13.64, citation index range from 1 to 554, SNIP range 0.293 to 1.642, SJR range 0.194 to 5, Number listed in international database 156 and h-index 1 to 10.
- · Faculty members are also serving on the boards of national and international journals as editors and reviewers. The faculty members have been nominated as members in the Board of Studies, senate and syndicate of the university.

The College won overall general championship trophy with 29368 points in men's section in Inter College/Inter University/National Tournaments in 2017-18. A total of 131 Players from different games participated in All India Inter University and National level tournament and they bagged 53 Gold, 45 Silver and 55 Bronze medals.

- The college is using solar energy for meeting the electricity needs of the college, solar water heaters for hot water in hostels and solar street lights.
- The college takes various measures such as planting of trees and plants, creation/ expansion of grounds, infrastructure development without disturbing the green cover, rain water harvesting, energy conservation by use of solar energy and recycling/ management of waste.

The college has collaborated with agencies like Punjab Agriculture University Ludhiana, Bhartiya Sahit Academy, Columbia Water Centre, California (USA) and Sarbat Da Bhala Charitable Trust, Dubai for its various academic and research related activities. The department of the college collaborate national/state/local/institutions/agencies for their academic, research and beyond scholarly activities.

Letter of Autonomous Status to Khalsa College Amritsar

Observations of the Committee:

- Khalsa College, Amritsar affiliated with Guru Nanak Dev University (GNDU) was established in 1892 in a lush green 300 acres of land which is registered under the name of management.
- The college accredited with A Grade by NAAC thrice in 2003, 2011 and 2017. Last third cycle accredition resulted with 3.47 CGPA.
- The College is declared fit under 2(f) & 12(b) of University Grants Commission Act 1956.
- The management of Khalsa College is old and progressive. They have developed well planned, spacious and good quality infrastructure of the college. At present College has 210 class rooms, 80 laboratories, 17 ICT rooms, 5 boys and 3 girls hostels. All 8 hostels can accommodate 1000 students approximately. Well established dispensary with full time doctors with nursing staffs are within the campus. All science laboratories are well equipped with scientific instruments for both UG and PG teaching
- The College offers 4 M.Phil. programmes, 26 Post Graduate programmes, 20 Under Graduate programmes and 3 Post Graduate diploma programmes.
- The Sports achievement by the students are very encouraging. The College produced many players who participated in different Olympics and Asiads.
- The campus is enabled with WiFi facilities with a speed of 60mbps.
- The College has strong alumni base spread over the country and abroad.
- The College provides various types of scholarships for needy students.
- There is a well established examination cell with all necessary facilities. The Controller of Examinations has been appointed for smooth functioning of examinations and evaluation. The results are declared after scrutinizing by the two retired senior personal from the parent university.
- The College has also Solar power station (775 KW) which fulfils major requirements of campus
- Statuatory bodies including Governing body, Academic Council, Finance Committee and Board of Studies for various subjects have been properly constituted. All such bodies conduct meeting at regular

Suggestions of the Committee

- The Faculty-student ratio should be maintained and promotion under Career Advancement Scheme should be implemented timely for eligible Faculty in accordance with UGC Regulations. To improve high quality research, Non-Ph.D Faculty must be encouraged for Doctoral degree. The College should subscribe more research oriented journals for various Departments.
- Research activities and culture should be further strengthened with high quality research publication. Faculty should be encouraged to submit research proposal to different funding agencies such as DST, DBT, BRNS, UGC, ISRO, CSIR etc.
- The College should strengthen their Training & Placement Cell and career counciling services be conducted more frequently for students.
- The College should take some initiative to start some new programs such as Earn while learn through which students can learn something
