PREFACE

Khalsa College Amritsar is a historic institution of higher education situated in Northern India. It was established on 5th March, 1892 A.D. with the main objective to spread the benefits of modern education in Humanities, Agriculture, Science and Technology amongst the people of Punjab. The avowed aim of its forefathers was the eradication of ignorance, illiteracy and pernicious social evils devilling the Indian society through enlightened, progressive and value oriented education. During the past 125 years Khalsa College has set new milestones, scaled new heights and influenced not only the destiny of the people of Punjab but also played its fore-ordained role in shaping the history of the nation.

The grandeur and majesty of its building eloquently expresses the cherished ideals conceived by its founding fathers. The structure of its building is a blend of Mughal, Sikh and Rajput architecture. It embodies strength as well as fineness and is full of aesthetic beauty and art. This building imparts blended impression of a palace and religious place. The high domes touching the sky are the manifestation of spirituality, religiosity and educational enlightenment, symbolising strength and action. The fort-like walls of the college stand like guards against social adversities and impediments.

The history of Khalsa College is practically the history of Renaissance among the Sikhs. After the British annexation of Punjab, in the wake of decline of Maharaja Ranjit Singh's empire, the Sikhs were devoid of their State as the same had been confiscated. The flickering torch of religious, social and political life among the Sikhs that was becoming dimmer after the fall of Sikh Empire has been kept burning by Khalsa college and the college has also contributed floods of light and learning to the remotest and darkest corners of the country. Khalsa College has also helped to raise the status of Sikh Community in the field of education. The founding fathers of Khalsa College wanted to provide such education which would cater to the needs of the changing society and also compete with the quality of education offered by the Britishers. They took upon themselves the gigantic task of enkindling a spirit of nationalism, social upliftment and religious commitment in the minds of Punjabis by creating an awareness of their history, tradition, culture and heritage through their own value system and cultural ideals.

The main objective of Khalsa College was to spread modern education in science, technology and humanities on western lines so that youth of the region were kept abreast of the times promoting and preserving Indian and Sikh values among them. Promotion of Punjabi language and the propagation of invaluable Sikh cultural heritage were its other professed goals. Although the stress was laid on moulding and reshaping the Punjabi youth according to the Sikh ideals, Khalsa College has always maintained and promoted secular stance and outlook since its inception. The first three students enrolled in the college were a Sikh, a Hindu and a Muslim.

Khalsa College Amritsar is the first and the only autonomous college of Guru Nanak Dev University. It was bestowed with the status of "College with Potential for Excellence" by UGC in the year 2006. The college was selected under "Star College Scheme" by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India in March 2009. The college was also given grant under 'FIST Programme' by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India in July 2009. We feel proud in putting on record that the college was accredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC during the first accreditation in 2003 and its 2nd cycle of accreditation in 2011.

The heritage building of Khalsa College Amritsar is a composite institute with 7 wings, consisting of Faculties of Agriculture, Food Science & Technology, Commerce and Business Administration, Computer Science, Humanities, Sciences and Physiotherapy. It is the only college under GNDU which offers B.Sc. and M.Sc. in Agriculture. B.Sc. in Agriculture was started in 1931.

The eco friendly campus of the college covers an area of over 300 acres and provides the best infrastructure required for higher education. The college has 203 class rooms, 80 laboratories for UG and PG students, 17 ICT rooms, a spacious auditorium-cum-conference hall, 2 seminar halls equipped with audio visual facilities and a central library building. It has 5 boys' hostels and 8 girls' hostels which provide accommodation to 1350 resident students. The campus also has a Gurudwara Sahib, Gymnasium, Dispensary (with First Aid, Inpatient, Outpatient, Ambulance and Emergency Care Facility), 65 acres Agriculture Farm, Dairy Farm, 30 acres Student Farm in addition to Farmer Training Centre, Organic Vegetable Farm and 10 Departmental Libraries, Botanical Garden, Swimming Pool, Nursery, Fruit Orchid, Cricket Stadium, Well maintained sprawling Play Grounds (Hockey, Football, Basketball and 400 meters Athletics Track), Career Guidance Cell, Placement Cell, Student Activity Centre, Vocational Training Centre, three Girls' Common Rooms and branches of two banks with two ATMs and one E-Lobby for banking services.

Sikh History Research Department was started under the leadership of Dr. Ganda Singh, a renowned Sikh historian and it developed into a Major Research Centre. It has a rich collection of documents related to Sikh history, art, culture, religion and philosophy. It houses a reference library and a gallery of thousands of manuscripts, rare books, portraits and paintings of great historical significance and value. The museum has a collection of 415 Photographs/ paintings, 601 manuscripts, 380 newspapers files (1904–1988), 90 newspapers clipping files and 35 magazines. Out of 6,416 books in the Sikh History Research Department, more than 500 books are a century old. There are a large number of paintings, photographs and weapons of 17th and 18th century. Research scholars in the fields of Punjabi literature, Sikh history and Religious studies from India and abroad use the valuable information from the department. The management has completed the laudable work of digitalization of manuscripts, books and old data of the department.

At present, the college has 304 teaching staff on rolls, out of which 113 are Ph.D., 43 M.Phil., 148 PGs and the strength of non-teaching staff stands at 331 members. The student strength has considerably increased over the years from 6208 in 2015-16 to 6930 (3439 boys and 3491girls) in 2016-17.

The college offers 4 M.Phil. courses, 26 P.G. courses, 22 U.G. courses, 3 P.G. Diplomas, 6 U.G. Diplomas, one certificate course and two Add on courses in Urdu and Spoken English. The college has certificate course in Cutting, Stitching, Embroidery and Food Preservation for the poor and needy women free of cost and free classes for the underprivileged children as part of the Community Services Programme of the college.

Khalsa College enjoys coveted status in sports. It has produced several Olympians, International, National and State level champions. The college today stands in all its brilliance and radiance in sports accomplishment. It secured 2nd position in the University in 2015-16 by increasing its points from 6,500 to more than 20,000 in two years, including 5,000 points of sports women. It is a rare distinction that all the eleven playing members of GNDU cricket team which won inter-varsity cricket tournament in 2015-16 were from Khalsa College Amritsar. The college has signed MoUs with Punjab Agriculture University, Ludhiana for Seed Production and Distribution and with a New Delhi based Organisation 'Sarbat Da Bhala Charitable Trust' which provides funds to students pursuing Diploma in Gatka (Martial Art). To promote and develop Cricket in the college, MoU was signed with Punjab Cricket Association.

Department of Youth Welfare & Cultural Activities of the college provides platform to the students to present their talent in various cultural activities. It has played a significant role in preserving and promoting the rich cultural heritage of Punjab. The college prides in producing artists of National and International fame in Theatre, Film, T.V. and Music.

The four units of NSS under their respective Co-ordinators aim at inculcating the spirit of social service among students, sensitizing them towards nation building welfare activities like blood-donation camps, literacy drive, voluntary health service, tree plantation etc. The 3 Wings of NCC (Army, Navy and Air force) strengthen discipline, team spirit and confidence among the cadets.

UGC Centre for coaching in Competitive Exams has been training students from the college and outside for many years. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college has been working towards realising the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. P.G. Department of English also offers coaching in IELTS and Spoken English.

Implementation of e-governance in the college has improved efficiency in administrative work and expediated services like enrolment, examination, results, e-lectures etc. It has empowered students and faculty, thus encouraging their participation in governance.

Over the last 125 years, ever since its inception, Khalsa College has moved ahead with changing times and needs, synchronizing tradition with modernity, preserving Punjabi culture and heritage. The college is devoted to the mission of nurturing highly intelligent young men and women of commitment and competence to strive for excellence in the development of mind and spirit.

It is a pleasant privilege to present the Self Study Report for the third cycle of re-accreditation.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Khalsa College Amritsar is a leading educational institution of North India. It has served the educational needs and aspirations of thousands of students ever since its establishment in 1892. The college is devoted towards imparting value based education in the areas of Agriculture, Commerce, Humanities and Science. The focus is on developing the multi-dimensional personality of the students, thus imbibing in them the confidence to compete with their counterparts from anywhere across the globe. In this college, education is for socio-economic mobility, future building, modernization blended with tradition and for self actualization. It is a place of learning where all strive towards excellence in the development of mind and spirit.

Khalsa College Amritsar, the **first autonomous college** of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar is applying for the re-accreditation in its 3rd cycle. It was accredited by NAAC with 'A' grade in 2003-04 and re-accredited 'A' grade with CGPA 3.41 in the scale of '4' in the year 2011-12. It also has the honour of College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) conferred in May 2006 by UGC. The Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India has conferred Star College status to the college under which departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology received special grants. The college also receives grants under Funds for Improvement of Infrastructure in Science and Technology (FIST) scheme of Department of Science and Technology, Government of India.



The autonomous status granted in May 2013, offered the college an opportunity to bring innovation in teaching, learning, research, evaluation and extension services.

Khalsa College Amritsar is spread over an area of 300 acres. The main building is a masterpiece of architectural delight – a blend of Mughal, Rajput and Sikh styles. The campus has sprawling lawns and playgrounds, swimming pool, cricket stadium, botanical garden, nursery, boys and girls hostels, residential quarters, library, dispensary, dairy farm, student farm, guidance centre, placement cell, common room for girls, canteens and Gurudwara Sahib. There are 203 spacious classrooms, 80 laboratories and 17 ICT rooms in addition to two Seminar Halls with a seating capacity of 350 and 150 persons and a Main Hall that can accommodate up to 600 persons. Another seminar hall with a capacity of 250 students is under construction in Commerce Block. The college library is fully computerized with bar coding system and has a rich collection of 1,89,302 books besides journals, magazines, regular newspapers etc. The laboratories of science departments are functional with the latest equipments. A Centralized Computer Laboratory with internet facility and Language Laboratory are added features of the college infrastructure. The Department of Physiotherapy is housed in a newly constructed wing with four laboratories viz., Anatomy, Physiology, Electro-therapy and Exercise therapy. Department of Bio-technology has Plant Tissue Culture Laboratory, Animal Cell Culture Laboratory and Instrumentation Room.

Various developments carried out by the college since the second accreditation of September 2011 are summed up briefly under the 7th criteria. The various thrusts of the college as presented in the seven criteria are:


- (a) Pursuit for academic excellence
- (b) Emphasis on quality learning and teaching
- (c) Fostering excellence in research

The quest for improvisation in academics has prompted the college to involve eminent scholars in restructuring the academic standards in order to maintain lead in the field of higher education. Keeping in view the requirements of National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), the college has a well formulated Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) since July 2004.

Khalsa College Amritsar is the only educational institution to have within its campus, a Sikh History and Research Department with a museum. Started in 1930, this department has preserved rich material related to Sikh history, art, culture and religion. Rare hand written manuscripts, historical documents, journals and magazines have been carefully preserved here. Visitors are fascinated by photographs, antiques, books, weapons etc. which are on display in the museum. This department continues to monitor and record all day to day events related to Sikh politics, religion and other related matters. Research scholars from all over the world frequently visit this department in search of material for their research projects.

Khalsa College has always enjoyed an envious position in the sports arena. A galaxy of sportsmen of Olympics, Commonwealth, Asian and National repute have been the proud products of this college. A large number of our students represent the country at international events and scores of them are champions at national, state, inter-varsity and inter-college level. Over the last few years, the motivation given to girls has prompted them to come forward and they have also competed at all levels and bagged laurels. All the 11 playing members of intervarsity Women Cricket Team of GNDU which won 1st position in 2015-16, were from Khalsa College Amritsar. The college provides the sports persons with free and special diets, fee concessions and even free boarding and lodging facilities. There is increase in financial assistance given to sports persons and for cultural

activities every year. The Annual Sports Day is a much awaited event in which all the students and teachers participate enthusiastically.



A lot of emphasis is given to research in the college and eight staff members have been recognized as Ph.D. research guides. During the last five years, 16 students were awarded Ph.D. degrees and 17 students are pursuing their Ph.D. degree under these supervisors. The teachers of various department are also supervising 79 M.Phil students. The college has established a Centralized Research Centre and two research centres in the departments of Agriculture and Commerce & Business Administration.

Khalsa College has lived up to the vision of its founding fathers. It has endeavoured to open the doors of knowledge to young men and women during its 125 years of existence. It has always believed in providing knowledge that must instill in students the cause and purpose to serve the society. The history of the college shows that it has kept abreast with the changing times by adapting itself to new climbs and new policies. It is still pursuing this philosophy. The college is seeking re-accreditation from National Assessment and Accreditation Council so that it can continue with its rich heritage.

CRITERION I - CURRICULAR ASPECTS

• Curriculum Design and Development

The academic programmes of the college are in consonance with its vision to emerge as a premier higher learning institution by creating, advancing and disseminating knowledge. The diversity in academic programmes aims at educating and empowering the learners, majority of whom are from rural areas, to realize their potential through righteous blending of knowledge, skills and values. While designing the curriculum, the relevance to the local/ regional/ national/ global developmental needs is always taken into consideration. The major considerations in the design process and development of the curriculum include employability, innovations, pursuit of higher knowledge, research, developing professional competencies and overall development of students. The employability aspect is given special attention. The projects in all professional courses, industrial visits, training camps, workshops, seminars, career counseling etc. are part of curriculum to enhance employability.

A large number of new courses have been started after the conferring of autonomous status. Some of these include M.Phil. (Punjabi, English, Political Science, Commerce), M.Sc. (Vegetable Science, Soil Science, Entomology, Pharmaceuticals, Food Science & Technology, Bio-Tech.), M.A. (Performing Arts, Fine Arts, History), Bachelors (Journalism & Mass Communication, Fashion Designing, Social Science), B.Com. (Hons.), B.Sc.(Hons.) in Physics, Chemistry, English, Punjabi and seven new electives in agriculture have been introduced.

• Academic Flexibility


All the departments have complete academic autonomy and follow a well defined curriculum design and development process. The suggestions of academic experts/industry/employment sector /alumni / other stakeholders within and outside the college are implemented after thorough discussions in the respective Board of Studies and Academic Council. The departments of the college have the academic flexibility and freedom to design the syllabus as per the guidelines of University Grants Commission for Autonomous Colleges. A number of new programs and program combinations are developed/ adopted to meet the needs of the students. The college follows semester system in all courses except Bachelor of Physiotherapy.


• Curriculum Enrichment

The curriculum is revised periodically. The curriculum provides adequate scope for introducing programmes in emerging thrust areas/interdisciplinary areas. A dialogue with academic experts/ industry/ employment sector /alumni/other stakeholders within and outside the college is undertaken for making the necessary changes in curriculum and starting of new courses, keeping in view the guidelines of UGC/University. The syllabi of the courses are revised taking cues from National and International Institutes and the syllabi of National level competitive examinations. The Board of Studies of various departments , the Academic Council and Governing Body of the College have members and experts from industry, academics and other stake holders who give suggestions for the curriculum enrichment.

• Feedback System

The feedback from the students as well as external experts is obtained at regular intervals in different formats. These are analyzed in departmental or curriculum committee meetings or specially called committee meetings. Each department takes structured feedback from students and considers it as an essential component in the curricular design and development process.







CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

• Student Enrolment and Profile

The college student enrolment, profile and admission process for various courses is transparent to all stakeholders and it is done through advertisement in print and electronic media. There is three tier admission process. The college stands committed to make teaching and learning 'Student Centric', so as to make the students think, analyze, be independent, original and creative.


The college admits students on entrance test basis, on merit basis and on first come first serve basis. The admission tests are conducted as per UGC guidelines with full transparency. The students have multiple choices to select the specific course offered by the college. The criteria for the selection of the students on entrance test basis include objective multiple choice based questions, interview and counseling are for merit based and first come first serve basis. The college reviews periodically its enrollment profile and the outcomes are used for improvement of the process. There is an upward trend in the number of admissions in the last five years. The total number of students admitted in 2016-17 was 7054 as compared to 3545 admitted in 2011-12.






• Catering to Student Diversity

The college has an inclusive admission policy catering to diverse student groups. A large number of students from the rural and urban areas belonging to diverse ethnic groups are admitted in various courses. The college caters to the educational needs varying from the developed cities at one hand and the rural and backward areas of the state on the other. The college provides the facility of fee concession to the disadvantaged section of the society according to state government rule, also to economically weaker section and to students of sports and cultural activities from its own funds. The college also provides 63 sponsored scholarships, and freeships from its own funds in addition to the scholarships and free-ships to the students by the state government. The amount of concessions besides 63 scholarships has increased from Rs. 19 lakhs in 2011-12 to Rs. 2 crore in 2015-16.





The college puts premium on continuous mentoring of the students. Induction and orientation programmes are organized in the beginning of the academic session and addressed by the Principal and respective Deans of faculties. The emphasis is laid on inculcation of human and ethical values, social responsibilities and environmental consciousness. The departments also conduct induction programmes at departmental levels for the new students. The programmes range from one to two days. The students are apprised of work culture, the working ethos, status of the department nationally and globally, research activities, student facilities, syllabus and course plans for each paper, academic calendar, internal and external examination patterns, internal tests, quizzes, assignments, student seminars, student projects, scheme of examination, ethics, discipline, zero tolerance on ragging and environmental awareness initiatives. Healthy interaction between teachers and students are encouraged. The students are given exposure of compulsory projects / dissertations / visits to industry / national laboratories/ institutes. Besides this, inputs are also given about cultural, sports and alumni activities and student feedback mechanism. The academic growth of differently-abled students is also analyzed and tutorials for needy students are arranged. Physically challenged students are provided classes on the ground floor. Bilingual teaching is adopted to cater to the inadequacy in English competence.


Teachers motivate such students in their vernacular language. Learning needs of students are analysed after formative tests. The remedial classes are held for weaker and slow learners. Advanced learners are offered enrichment courses. Moreover, the courses/projects are offered after informal discussion in the department with the advanced learners. Advanced learners in PG programmes are associated with the departmental research projects. Projects / field experiences are integrated into the learning programmes. Training is also arranged for the students in various institutions/industries. They are encouraged to present papers at seminars, contribute articles in the college magazines/research journals and encouraged to represent the college in inter collegiate events/ youth festival at State/National levels.

• Teaching Learning Process

The college has earned a place for itself in the region on account of its quality instructional programmes, innovative courses and excellent infrastructure for teaching learning process. Student centric methods are an integral part of the pedagogy adopted by the faculty that includes experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies. The learning environment is conducive for critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The college fosters an inclusive academic ambience. In consultation with the departments, academic calendar for teaching, learning and evaluation activities is planned and printed in the college prospectus which is available to students and faculty before the commencement of the session. The detailed academic calendar is prepared keeping in view the special needs of students, remedial classes for weaker students and enrichment courses for advanced learners, extra-curricular, sports and cultural activities. The departments meticulously plan and organize the teaching schedules and time tables as per the departmental academic calendar. Besides the lecture methods, latest technologies are being used by the faculty for effective teaching. The judicious mix of lecture method and ICT based teaching is adopted such as smart boards, multimedias, OHPs, audio visual aids, use of charts, models, slides, ppts, quizzes, seminars, workshops, group discussions, assignments and tutorials are regular features of class room teaching and learning. The creativity among the learners is instilled through various events like TechFest, Comm-Fest, Literary Sabha, Sports, Rangoli, Collage making, Debate/Declamation contests, Quiz competitions etc.

• Teacher Quality

The college has adequate and well qualified, nationally and internationally acclaimed faculty. The college has 26 Associate Professors and 26 Assistant Professors on permanent/regular basis 50 on contract basis and 16 management approved entrusted with the task of imparting education to the students. In addition, the teachers on adhoc basis are also employed every year. In 2016-17, 183 adhoc teachers and 03 part time teachers were also recruited. Amongst the faculty, 113 teachers possess Ph.D. degree, 43 teachers possess M.Phil. degree, and rest are post graduates. Encouraging diversity in the recruitment of faculty, the teachers are recruited as per the qualifications and the eligibility conditions laid down by UGC/GNDU/Punjab Government guidelines.



The college facilitates the participation of its teachers in faculty development programmes. With proactive policies of development of faculty, the college provides facilities for learning advanced technology and pedagogy tools. Faculty is provided with the facility of research grants, study leave, leave to attend international/national seminars, conferences etc. Leave is also granted to attend refresher/orientation courses as per requirement of the faculty. In the last five years, 29 teachers have attended refresher courses, 5 have attended GOC and 38 Summer/ Winter Schools and other training programs by 15 teachers. Guest lectures by resource persons from various areas of specialization are organized to give faculty an opportunity to update their knowledge. Teachers are encouraged to submit research projects to various funding agencies. In the session 2015-16, 4 projects have been sanctioned by these funding agencies. The faculty members are also encouraged to demonstrate creativity and innovation in teaching.

• Evaluation Process and Reforms

The students are continuously evaluated through tests, assignments, quizzes, seminars and semester/final examinations. The performance of the students is displayed on notice boards as well as on website of the college. The college disseminates the information regarding evaluation processes and results to

all its stakeholders through website and notice boards. The evaluation process is learner centric as per UGC guidelines. A complete transparency is observed in the setting of question papers, evaluation of answer sheets and declaration of results. The students have ample chances for the remedy of any grievance regarding evaluation/marking. There is provision for re-checking and re-evaluation as per University rules. The college has adopted a revolutionary change by way of allowing the examinees to see the evaluated answer scripts under RTI Act in 2012 for UG/PG courses offered by the college.

Students of the college possess fundamentals of the subjects, knowledge of current trends in their disciplines, a sound practical orientation, good communication skills, ethical values, social responsibilities and an environment friendly attitude. Monitoring of this is done at the departmental level. The emphasis is on development of a set of skills required for the industry, research, and higher education. Communication skills are improved by language laboratory and activities of career counseling and placement cell. Ethical values, social responsibilities and environment friendliness are nurtured through lectures on values and on achievements of great personalities.

Women Empowerment:

- Equal opportunities are given to women staff in administrative work of the college..
- Equal opportunities and facilities are given to girl students in various committees, societies, sports, co-curricular extension activities.
- Women Grievance Cell is created to address the women related issues.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

• Promotion of Research

To make Khalsa College a centre of academic excellence, the college has developed research culture among students and the faculty. The different departments of the college are actively engaged in research and create advanced knowledge. The college has a Research Committee for fostering excellence in research by formulating 'Research Policy' of the college for promotion of research. Eminent scientists and experts are regularly invited for fostering a research culture and enthusing the learners and researchers. The college regularly seminars, workshops and guest lectures. 138 organizes conferences, seminars/workshops/conferences were organized in the last five years. Two research journals, with ISSN registration, are started by the college. Besides a centralized research centre, two research centres are established in the Departments of Agriculture and Commerce & Business Administration. UGC has recognized the college as "Centre with Potential for Excellence" status. Four of its teaching departments are supported under "STAR scheme" of DBT. The Department of Chemistry is supported under DST-FIST. The college aims at promoting inter-disciplinary research. One major project "Agents of Change" is being undertaken by the Department of Agriculture in collaboration with Columbian Water Centre, California (USA) to identify the socio-economic and agricultural problems of rural people.

• Resource Mobilization for Research

A Central Research Centre and 2 research centres at the departmental level have been set up to assist research activities in the college. The expenditure incurred on research related infrastructure and activities by the college has increased by 71.5 percent during 2012-13 to 2015-16. Duty leave is granted to faculty for presenting research papers in seminars/conferences. The college has received over Rs. 1.14 crore through major and minor research project grants during 2011-2015. Four departments of the college (Agriculture, Chemistry, Physics and Commerce) have been recognized for their research activities and have received and utilized grants under CPE scheme for Phase I and II. In January 2015, the college received a grant of Rs. 1.50 crore from UGC under Phase III of this scheme for the five years plan of 2015-16 to 2019-20.

• Research Facility

The college has an ample infrastructure and human resources for research. The college has excellent research facilities in terms of laboratory equipments, research journals and research incentives made available to the faculty. Teaching departments have basic equipments and facility for research purposes such as computers, internet, printers, instruments etc. The central as well as departmental libraries are well equipped and computerized to facilitate the research related activities. The library has 1,89,302 books and subscribes to 124 journals/ magazines apart from a rare book section. The college is making all out efforts for more National and International cooperation and collaboration with organizations to enhance research quality and standards. The teachers are encouraged to apply for the research projects from various funding agencies. They are provided with duty leave and offered seed money by the college for pursuing research and attending workshops/conferences etc.

• Research Publications and Awards

Faculty members have published nearly 707 research papers in peer reviewed/reputed journals, 104 books with ISBN, 159 chapters in books and 27 edited books in the last five years. The impact factors of the journals range from 0.04 to 13.64, citation index range from 1 to 294, SNIP range 0.293 to 1.642, SJR range 0.194 to 5, Number listed in international database 43 and h-index 1 to 10. Faculty members have also presented large number of papers in national and international conferences and published papers in proceedings of the conferences. Faculty members are also serving on the boards of national and international journals as editors and reviewers. The faculty members have been nominated as members in the Board of Studies, senate and syndicate of the university. Research scholars and the faculty of the college have received best research paper awards and other prestigious awards from various organizations.

• Consultancy

The college encourages staff participation in consultancy services and many consultancy services are provided to different communities. Academic expertise of the faculty members is publicized on the college website. Broad areas of consultancy services provided by the college include OPD services in the Department of Physiotherapy, supplying high yielding variety plants and seeds to the farmers, providing latest information to the farmers about new seeds, fertilizers and farming techniques by the Farm Training Centre of the college, providing training to the women from weaker section of the society about stitching, tailoring, embroidery, household consumables, food processing and preservation. Only Physiotherapy department provides consultancy services at nominal rates while other departments extend this service free of cost to the users.

• Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The college organized large number of extension activities associated with different departments which are helpful in adding to the knowledge of students and faculty, thus improving their personality. The faculty members are also invited by NGOs and other bodies/institutes to deliver lectures on various important topics. The college promotes many activities which help the students to acquire training and attitude for making contribution to sustained development of the community. Various programmes being run by the college for promoting college neighborhood network and student engagement include Blood donation camps, Tree plantation drives, Cleanliness drive, Rallies for voters awareness, Adult learning programmes and Campaign against female foeticide etc. Under the Agents for Change programme, each student of B.Sc. (Agriculture) is required to adopt a village and study its socio-economic profile and identify its problems related to agriculture. The college is running a Lifelong Learning Center in its premises where women from weaker section of the society are given free 3 months training in cutting, tailoring, food processing etc. Also, the children of labourers are provided free education in this centre so as to ensure social justice and to empower the underprivileged and most vulnerable section of the society. Gender Club has been set up by the college to sensitize the students about the issues related to gender discrimination.

Collaboration

The college has collaborated with agencies like Punjab Agriculture University Ludhiana, Bhartiya Sahit Academy, Columbia Water Centre, California (USA) and Sarbat Da Bhala Charitable Trust, New Delhi for its various academic and research related activities. The department of the college collaborate with national/state/local/instutitions/agencies for their academic, research and beyond scholarly activities. The college is looking for collaborations with national and international institutions for faculty exchange, students' training and other academic programs.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

• Physical Facilities

The college lays great emphasis on infrastructure and learning resources to enable the learners righteous blending of knowledge, skills, and values for serving the society. A conducive physical ambience for the faculty is created by providing physical and IT infrastructure, good departmental and central library resources, e-journals, databases, seminar halls, conference halls and multimedia facilities. The college is supported from UGC grants under UGC-CPE, DST-FIST, DBT, research project grants, besides its own provisions to provide encouraging environment for the faculty to carry out the research work.

All the departments have well furnished classrooms. The majority of the postgraduate departments have their own libraries with ancillary facilities, computers and internet connectivity. The college has 203 classrooms, 56 labs, 09 computer labs, 15 research labs, 17 ICT rooms, 2 seminar halls, one main hall, one botanical garden, health centre, dairy farm and farmer training centre. The hostels are well designed, provisioned and maintained. The college has 5 boys' hostels and 8 girls' hostels with a occupancy of 1350 students. The Health Centre and Farm Training Centre are very valuable supporting facilities on the campus. The college has vibrant Career Counseling Cell, Placement Cell and Language Laboratory. All academic information related to the admissions, examinations, results and notices are displayed on the college website and notice boards. The college has a well equipped department of Physical Education, play grounds such as hockey, football, basketball and cricket grounds, swimming pool, 400 metres athletic track in addition to the gymnasium to provide sports facilities and recognize and nurture sporting talent. The college has a heritage hall with a seating capacity of 600 persons in addition to two seminars cum conference halls with state-of-the-art audio visual and performance facilities.

The total amount spent on the development of infrastructure during 2011-12 to 2015-16 is more than Rs. 14 crore which includes Rs.50 lakhs on ICT, Rs.70 lakhs on research and Rs. 13 crore on buildings and other infrastructure. Various academic programmes and cultural activities are organized throughout the year under the banner of Department of Cultural Affairs. Adequate budgetary provisions and maintenance processes are available to provide the infrastructure and physical facilities all round the year. The college has engineering section to take care of maintenance and basic infrastructure. The college also houses two banks, one extension counter of Punjab National Bank, ATMs, cafeteria and 4 canteens for staff and students.

• Library as a Learning Resource

The Central Library along with 12 departmental libraries provide diverse learning resources. The library is equipped with books, periodicals, latest national and international e-journals. The library is fully automated with all the books bar coded. The Orbit Software is being used for automating library facilities. The college library has 1,89,302 books, 124 journals, 36 periodicals, 590 manuscripts, 314 encyclopedias, 800 e-books, 432 thesis, 4502 back volumes, 316 CDs and DVDs. Adequate reprographic and internet facility with the connectivity under UGC-INFLIBNET are available in the library. Besides central library, all the departments have their own library facilities for students and researchers. An amount of more than Rs.1.00 crore has been spent during 2011-12 to 2015-16 for purchasing books, journals and periodicals.

• IT Infrastructure

Computers with latest technology and applications have been deployed in the college. The college has its own firewall installed in examination branch, computer science department and administrative block. The college has very well designed, equipped and maintained Centralised Computer Lab available for faculty and students. All the hostels have internet facility on 24x7 basis. All sections of Administrative Office are ICT enabled. All the administrative work is carried through e-governance. The teachers upload their lectures on the egovernance portal. The students can study through e-lectures at any time. The examination branch is also fully IT enabled. Customized developed software is deployed for admissions, accounts, examinations and result processing. More than 300 computers are available with internet facility for office and laboratory work in the departments and the college.


CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

• Student Mentoring and Support

The college has a well co-ordinated system for student support and mentoring. Students are mentored in academics, sports and cultural activities. They are supported for the development of career, soft-skills and life skills. To provide academic as well as financial support, different committees/cells have been established such as a Counseling Cell, a Career Guidance Cell and Placement Cell. They are mentored to develop professional skills as well as to develop ethics, human values, sense of social responsibility and environment consciousness. The departments mentor the students in all possible ways to cater their academic, social and career needs. The college provides coaching for Civil Services, State Administrative Services, UGC-NET, GATE, and Bank Probationary Officers, particularly for SC/ST and minority students through Centre for Preparation of Competitive Examinations. The placement cell invited 43 companies and 399 students got campus placement during the last five years.

The support system functions through various heads like Dean Academic Affairs, Dean Students Welfare (Boys and Girls), Dean Public Relations, Dean Research, Dean Sciences, Dean Agriculture, Dean Commerce, Dean Humanities, Dean Languages and Alumni Association, Dean Cultural Activities and overall it is monitored by the Principal. The system works in a coordinated manner to ensure the overall development of the students. The faculty members and administration continuously interact with the students about their academic and personal progress. The college prospectus is updated and published annually. The prospectus presents a comprehensive view of the college history, its vision, mission, rules and regulations, hostel facilities, courses, admission procedure and fee-details. Information regarding faculties, academic bodies, committees, programmes offered, departmental details, general rules, dress code, attendance, scholarships, various subject societies, is provided in detail. Financial aid is provided through approximately 63 scholarships and stipend schemes (academic and sports) apart from the government scholarships and 35 medals and prizes. The college provides free education, hostel accommodation, free meals and

scholarships to sports persons. Full fee concession for university toppers is also provided by the college. The following graph shows the financial assistance provided to deserving students.



Special efforts are made to ensure women participation in sports and cultural activities. In the session 2015-16, all the eleven playing members of women cricket team of GNDU which won inter-varsity 1st position were from Khalsa College Amritsar. A Talent Search week is organized by the Youth Welfare Department to identify talented boys and girls and then they are subsequently guided and polished for various competitions. The college helps the SC/ST/OBC and minority students to apply and avail the various central and state scholarships to the deserving students of economically weaker sections. Meritorious and needy students are given books from Book Bank of the college main library. The college has Grievances Cell for women. The college has Dean of Students Welfare (Boys and Girls) to address the problems of the students. The students can also approach the Departmental Heads, Dean Student Welfare and the Principal for any of their problems.

• Student Progression

137 students have been selected in the national level and state level examinations viz. UGC-NET, CSIR-NET, GATE and Civil and Judicial Services during last five years. About 40 per cent students enrolled themselves for higher degrees in the same department or joined national level research organizations within the country and abroad, and more than 35 per cent students got employment (on campus and off campus) or absorbed as entrepreneurs.

• Student Participation and Activities

The students are encouraged to participate actively in co-curricular activities. Talented students in cultural activities and sports are given weightage in the admission and provided financial assistance.

Cultural and sports activities are conducted throughout the academic year for overall development of the students. In sports 60-80 women students and 200-339 boy students, in cultural activities 30-37 girl and 50-70 boy students participate every year. Inter college competitions and youth festivals are also organized by the college every year. There are various Subject Societies functioning in the college which provide a platform to polish the talents of students by organizing academic and co-curricular programmes. The postgraduate meritorious alumni are nominated as member of Boards of Studies of the college. Their suggestions serve as an objective tool to introduce need based changes in the syllabus. The students also actively participate and contribute their articles in college magazine 'Darbar' and wall magazines in every department.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

• Institutional Vision and leadership

Khalsa College is an emblem of rich history and cultural heritage. The college was visualized as a place of learning that would strive towards higher degrees of excellence in the development of the mind and spirit. Progress is our watch word and academic achievement our measure of success. A sense of grandeur and beauty pervades the campus. The college aims at providing and designing the courses as per global needs of the students and offers professional and job oriented courses which help in easy absorption of aspirations in the market. To help students in their multi-dimensional personality development, the college also encourages them to participate in religious, cultural, co-curricular, literary and sports activities. The college regularly organizes lectures and seminars to promote morality, acquaint students with social values and their responsibility towards the society.

The college administration runs through the various academic bodies constituted as per the UGC guidelines. The Board of Studies of various departments send their recommendations to the Academic Council, which in turn sends the approved items of their meetings for final approval in the Governing Body. The decentralized governance system of college consists of Principal as Head of the institution, Dean Academic Affairs, Deans of Faculties, Registrar, Controller of Examination, Heads of various departments and teaching staff.

• Strategy Development and Deployment

The college prepares comprehensive plan for overall development every year. The teachers are encouraged to join faculty development programmes, for which duty leave is granted to them. The college through its research committee motivates the teachers to apply for research projects. Free internet access, printout and xerox facilities have been provided to the teachers within their departments. OPD in Physiotherapy Department, Farmer Training Centre and Vocational Training Centre etc. are part of college's policy of community engagement. The college has its own Industry Linkage Cell which actively works in developing relationship with industries.

The college has signed an MoU with 'Sarbat Da Bhala Trust' New Delhi. The trust has undertaken to sponsor 75% of the fees of 50 students who pursue Diploma in Gatka (martial art). The trust has paid Rs. 11,25,000 during the session 2016-17. The college has also signed MoU with Punjab Agriculture University, Ludhiana for quality seed production and distribution among the farmers at fair price. To promote and develop cricket in the college, an MoU with Punjab Cricket Association has been signed.

The college has set up Farmer Training Centre with an aim to fulfill the diverse needs of the farmers in the form of training, seeds availability, consultancy with experts, understanding and solving their problems. The college has established IQAC for regular reviews of the quality standards of teaching. The quality policy is designed in the meetings of all Heads, Deans and other Administrators under the chairmanship of the Principal. The IQAC meets regularly to keep a watch on quality aspects. The college has made concerted efforts to prepare and submit Annual Quality Assurance Reports regularly to NAAC. Feedback is taken regularly from the students on teaching-learning process and curriculum. All the departments are required to submit self appraisal performas of teachers to the IQAC. On the basis of these performas, Internal Audit Committee conducts performance audit of all the departments.

• Faculty Empowerment Strategies

The college leaves no stone unturned to enhance the professional development of its faculty. Regular seminars, guest lectures, workshops and conferences are organized by the college to upgrade the knowledge of teaching staff. The teachers are encouraged to attend refresher courses, General Orientation Courses, Summer/Winter Trainings, workshops and seminars organized by UGC-Human Resource Development Centre or other organizations. Workshop on computer learning is organized by the college to appraise non-teaching staff on computer related technicalities. The performance appraisal system is followed as per the UGC guidelines. To provide medical assistance to staff members, the college has set up Health Centre with a full time qualified doctor and two attendants. OPD facility is also provided in Physiotherapy department. Accommodation facility for teaching and non teaching staff is available in college campus.

• Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

As per the Autonomous college guidelines, the college has established Finance Committee comprising of college Principal, Bursar and Finance Secretary of college management. Most of the funds required for resource mobilization are raised through fee charged from the students. The college also mobilizes funds by acquiring grants from State Government, Central Government (DBT, UGC) and MP LAD funds. The college has also raised 63 sponsored scholarships for the benefit of economically weaker bright students.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

• Environment Consciousness

The college is located in an area of 300 acres with green vegetations and vast lush green playgrounds and fields. To keep the campus clean and green, the college takes various measures such as planting of trees and plants, creation/

expansion of grounds, infrastructure development without disturbing the green cover, rain water harvesting, energy conservation by use of solar energy and recycling/ management of waste.

The college has large green cover for carbon neutrality and it keeps on increasing this cover by regular plantation drives in and around the campus. All the new constructed buildings have water harvesting bores (11 bores) to recharge the sub soil water. All the rain water flows from the buildings of the college to lawns and grounds thus irrigating them and recharging sub surface water level. Non conventional energy sources like solar lights (20) and solar water heaters are used in the campus. The CFL/LED bulbs have been installed in the campus for energy conservation. The college has installed coloured dustbins at different places for bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste management. The waste is collected by municipal van every day for its proper disposal. Bio-medical waste is disposed off through a liaison agency "Amritsar Bio-medical Waste Disposal" under annual contract with them since the year 2011. A government registered company "Attero Recyclying" has been engaged and 3865 Kg of e-waste was disposed off in environment friendly manner.

• Innovations

A single window admission system has been initiated where offices of Registrar, Accounts, E-governance concerned with the admission process alongwith bank extension counter and e-governance have been brought at the same place thereby simplifying the admission process. The admission committee provides information to SC/ST and OBC students regarding special incentives for them resulting in significant increase (i.e. from 48 SC/ST students in 2013-14 to 819 SC/ST in 2016-17) in enrolment of SC/ST and minority students in the institution from the last three years. The college has been constantly encouraging the students to participate in research activities. Two new research journals (in the field of sciences and languages) have been started and students were made subscribers and they were also encouraged to submit research papers for these journals. A farmer centric programme i.e. Agents of Change has been started by Khalsa College Amritsar in collaboration with Columbian Water Centre, USA. Faculty members and students of agriculture department visited 65 villages of Amritsar and Tarn Taran district to gather information regarding socio economic problems of farmers of this region. The Vocational Training Centre under lifelong learning programme offers free three months certificate courses in cutting, tailoring, embroidery, food processing and preservation to economically weak women from nearby areas for their self employment. Free education to under privileged childrens is provided by NSS volunteers of the college in this centre. Tutorial groups have been formed which are helpful in providing useful feedback regarding department and college level deficiencies in teaching and learning process, infrastructure requirements and other general problems. The college has fully equipped audio visual language laboratory which has helped students to learn the finer aspects of examination such as right pronunciations, usage of appropriate words etc.

• Best Practices

The college observes number of best practices such as Institutional Social Responsibility, Use of Information Technology for Administration, Staff Club, Tutorial Groups, Remedial Classes, Subject Societies in departments, Inculcating Moral and Religious Values and Students Social Activities. However, two best practices which have significantly contributed in the improvement of academic as well as administrative functioning of the college are:




Best Practice – I


The Institutional Social Responsibility has been a part of the mission of our institution i.e. to imbibe students with moral values and disciplines taught by the gurus for the benefit of the community and the country. The institution emphasizes on development of moral values and sensitizes students regarding their social responsibility of bringing improvement in socio economic status of economically backward and rural population. Khalsa College Amritsar, being pioneer educational institution of this area, has accepted its responsibility for social well being in consonance with the policies of the nation.

The college fulfills its social responsibility through various measures such as:


- Farmer Training Centre
- Physiotherapy OPD facility at nominal rates
- Vocational Training Centre
- Scholarships for needy students
- Free Career Guidance
- Awareness Campaign
- Gender Equality
- Environment Friendly Approach
- Farmer Training Centre: A farmer training centre has been functioning in the college since 1969 to provide latest information by experts to supplement income of the farmers of the area through farmer trainings, field demonstrations and expert extension lectures in the field of agriculture to the farmers. The centre organizes more than 100 block level and district level camps annually in collaboration with state agriculture department. It also imparts training in bee keeping, mushroom cultivation, pest control, food and vegetable processing. The centre is also actively working to improve the socio economic status of women in farming business by organizing 183 training camps in the last five years where more than 6000 women participants have received training of food processing techniques like pickle, jam, jellies, squash, sauces making etc. Moreover, one Soil testing lab and one Bio pest control lab have been established for the benefit of farmers of this rural belt.







- **Physiotherapy OPD at nominal charges**: The college runs out-patient facility along with treatment using latest machinery in physiotherapy department for everyone at nominal charges. The Department of Physiotherapy organizes free medical camps where free medical checkup, physiotherapy treatment, homeopathic treatments and free medicines are provided to poor patients.
- Vocational Training Centre: The centre under lifelong learning program offers free three months certificate courses in cutting, tailoring, embroidery, food processing and preservation to economically weak women from nearby areas. Free education to under privileged children is provided by NSS volunteers of the college in this centre.
- Scholarship for Needy Students: The college provides 63 scholarships for economically weaker and poor bright students for their education. Moreover the college also provides fee concessions to needy students on the recommendation of admission committee.
- Free Career Guidance: The college organized free career guidance seminar for principals and students of all the schools of this region. Free career guidance books are provided to all the schools of Amritsar and nearby districts so as to guide students regarding career options in their field of choice. The career guidance is provided through a cell working under the guidance of Director Career Guidance who happens to be a senior faculty member of the college.
- Awareness Campaign: The college organizes one seminar and a poster making competition every year in collaboration with Red Ribbon Club, so as to generate awareness in youth against social evils like drug abuse, AIDS etc. Moreover, the theatre group of the college organizes plays and street plays (Nukad Natak) on social issues within and outside the campus regularly.
- Gender Equality: In the society where adverse sex ratio due to female foeticide and poor literacy among females persists, the college fulfills its responsibility by providing safe and qualitative educational opportunity to females. The college has created cell for Grievance Redressal and Dean Student Welfare (girls) is a senior member who takes care of the problems of girl students. This has resulted in a considerable increase in the strength of girl students and more than 50% of the total students admitted are girls.



- Environment Friendly Approach: The college has adopted eco-friendly approach to reduce air and water pollution by sensitizing and involving the students, staff members and society for environmental conservation for its sustainability. The institutional environmental friendly approach involves many practices such as organic farming, celebrating van-mahotsava every year, maintaining nursery of ornamental, fruit and flower plants, use of renewable sources of energy, ground water recharge, reduction in CO₂ emission and efficient waste management practices.
- Heritage Conservation: The college building restoration work is regularly being carried out so as to conserve the heritage structure. In order to conserve rare manuscripts and Sikh artefacts, the college has one museum in the old block.

Best Practice – II

Use of IT in Administration or E-Governance enables the use of information technology in administration or e-governance is the second best practice followed by the college and it has helped in improving the administrative work, admission process and examination work more simpler and transparent as it involves quick exchange of information among all stakeholders. Centralized egovernance office has been established in the administrative block of the college with co-ordinator, e-governance, 18 teacher incharges and two full time employees for uploading of information. One e-governance cell has been established in every department of the college and one teacher incharge i.e., Eighteen teacher incharges for e-governance have been appointed for departmental information uploading. All the employees have been provided with one e-governance account for sharing information from their department ID with the administration or students. The e-governance has become useful tool for students, staff members and administration for their diverse needs. The egovernance has benefitted the stakeholders immensely.

- For Students: The students can get information regarding their lecture statements, fee receipts, e-lectures, award lists, information about holidays and online lectures.
- For Staff: Information regarding inventory of all the departments like number of students, number of faculty members (department wise), annual budget (department wise), future expansion plans, all official as well as unofficial letters, salary statements, leave record and date of next annual increment of the employee etc. is available.
- For Management: The management of the college has administrative password for downloading information from this website and on the basis of the information available on this website, suitable policy is framed from time to time to manage the affairs of the college.

The paper usage in the campus has decreased significantly and evidence of success corroborated with constant upgradation of more services to the stake holders through e-governance.

- The only college in the region to have Sikh History and Research Department (established in 1930) having a reference library, gallery of rare manuscripts, rare books, paintings and portraits of historical significance, catering to the research scholars from all over the world.
- The college offers a large number of diversified programmes (62) including research degrees.
- State-of-art, spacious and well stocked library with more than 1.8 lakh books, reference books, manuscripts, encyclopedia besides 12 departmental libraries.
- Existence of participatory learning and governance through 28 Departmental Subject Societies with active participation of students.
- Introduction of ICT facilities.
- Leading college of north-west region that has earned name and fame globally in sports, cultural and co-curricular activities. Well maintained play grounds and infrastructural facilities. It has produced Olympians, international, national and state champions and also a good number of artists (theatre, singers, stand up comedians).
- A long list of renowned and eminent alumni who have made a mark in diverse fields and have contributed for continued development of their alma mater.
- Highly qualified faculty with 113 Ph.Ds. Most of the faculty members are engaged in research activities publishing more than 700 research papers in journals of international and national repute during the last five years.
- Social service through Extension Services viz., OPD in Physiotherapy, Farmers' Training Centre and Life Long Learning Centre for deprived and under privileged women of society.
- Health insurance of students besides 63 scholarships and stipends offered by the college.
- College publishes two research journals with ISSN numbers in Punjabi and Sciences.

1.2 Weaknesses

- The College faculty is not permitted by affiliating University to supervise Ph.D. and start MBA and MCA courses. Hence complete academic autonomy is not yet available to the college.
- Ban on filling of vacant posts by Punjab Government has been a big hindrance in appointment of teachers on regular basis. The government has not sanctioned any grant-in-aid post for a large number of courses started after 1982. To run the courses efficiently, the college has to appoint a large number of regular and adhoc faculty on its own.
- Funding and grants from the government are stagnant which does not help to preserve the public education ethos.
- Need to upgrade Research facilities and provide online access to research journals. Involvement of both teachers and students in interdisciplinary research could be enhanced.
- College lags in MoU and academic collaborations with institutions of repute.
- Practical difficulty with implementation of innovative and best practices given the diverse nature of students.
- Need for organizing more International Conferences/Seminars and workshops
- College is not able to attract students with good academic performance in graduate programmes of Arts and Humanities
- Need for upgradation of infrastructural facilities in many departments.

- To effectively implement choice based credit system.

- Collaborations with industries and other institutions for research activities/education Tours/trainings
- To attract more funds from UGC, CSIR, DST, FIST and other funding agencies
- Infrastructural requirements are continuously growing and require continuous updating.
- To ensure quality research facilities for faculty and students
- To motivate students for appearing in state and national level competitive exams
- To attract the best students with sound academic standards at the entry level in Arts and Humanities

2.2 Opportunities

- Immense scope for starting new courses.
- Further update of syllabi to meet modern and changing needs of students, society and employability. This will further enhance the scope for placements.
- To expand research activities in coming years so that students are able to participate in more inter disciplinary programmes and have better exposure to research problems and methodology.
- To expose students to quality techniques in terms of hand-on experience to keep up-to-date with changes in technology.
- To create opportunities for more collaborations with other Universities and institutions at national and international level.
- To start courses in the evening for working people and making optimum use of existing infrastructure.

- Centralized solar power generating system.
- Provision for environmental and green audit of the campus.

- The college got autonomous status in July 2013. It is the first college affiliated to GNDU to have been conferred the autonomous status.
- It is the only college in Punjab to start M.Phil. Courses in Languages, Humanities and Commerce.
- In the last two years, college has added 27,340 sq. mts. of covered area which is more than the earlier covered area 21,647 sq. mts.
- The college improved its position in sports in GNDU in the last two years. In 2014-15, the College overall 3rd position in the university by increasing its points from 6500 to 13,500. In 2015-16, the College improved further and achieved overall 2nd position in the university by securing more than 20,000 points including approximately 5000 points of sports persons.
- GNDU women cricket team were champions of All India inter-varsity cricket tournament in 2015-16 and 11 playing members of the team were from Khalsa College Amritsar.
- The college has established 5th Bio-pest lab. in Punjab as the organic way of pest control.
- The college started Life Long Learning Programme under Vocational Training Centre to provide free training to the underprivileged and poor women.
- Farmers Training Centre was established in 1969 under grant in aid scheme.
- Weather Station is provided to the students for their research and academic activities.
- Agricultural Department of the college has 65 acres of cultivable walled farm land for organic farming.
- The college has started prestigious courses such as B.Com. (Hons) in the session 2015-16 and B.Sc.(Hons.) in Chemistry, Physics, English and Punjabi in the session 2016-17.

CRITERION I CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 How are the institutional vision/mission reflected in the academic programs of the college?

Khalsa College is committed to preserve its rich history and cultural heritage and making it a place of learning that would strive towards ever higher degree of excellence in the development of the mind and spirit.

- It has preserved its rich history and culture by establishing Sikh History and Research Department that houses rare manuscripts, books, and a museum.
- Higher degree of excellence has been achieved by:
 - (a) Optimum transparency in admission of student and faculty appointment
 - (b) Upholding merit as foremost criterion
 - (c) Maintenance of work culture
 - (d) Discipline combined with freedom of thought and expression
 - (e) Sense of national consciousness.
- Development of mind and spirit is woven into the ambivalence of learning environment. Students are encouraged to give up all that is dogmatic, respect all religions, be honest and hard working, courteous towards the staff, faculty to be caring, understanding and responsive. Moreover emphasis is also laid on serving humanity and living life with dignity.

The Mission of Khalsa College is to "focus on transformative education in the context of globalization, to develop multi dimensional personality of the students by providing opportunity to participate in religious, cultural, cocurricular, theatrical, literary and sport activities, to provide opportunities for educational vocational, professional, social, linguistic and cultural development of students and instill sense of pride and achievements of personal accomplishments".

The mission of transformative education is practiced through:

- Planning academic curriculum with focus on student centeredness and practicising strategies and activities that have cognitive and effective objectives.
- Using teaching technologies that match student level appreciation.
- Laying emphasis on analytical and critical thinking by arranging workshops, seminars, extension lectures on environment sustainability and gender sensitization etc.
- Using methods of evaluating students learning by holding class tests, mid semester examinations, inter-departmental academic competitions promoting theatrical and co-curricular activities through theatre workshops, cultural activities.

• Teaching human values through NCC and NSS and teaching of life skills by arranging personality development lectures and imparting of soft skills.

The mission of opportunities for vocational, professional, social, linguistic and cultural development is reflected through wide variety of the graduate and post-graduate academic programs offered by the college.

1.1.2 Describe the mechanism used in the design and development of the curriculum? Give details on the process. (Need, Assessment, Feedback, etc)

The college attained the autonomous status in July 2013 and prior to this period, the curriculum of affiliating Guru Nanak Dev University was adopted.

The college believes in justifying the trust of its founding fathers by synchronizing tradition and modernity. The curriculum needs are assessed after getting feedback from eminent academicians, industry experts, alumni, students and their parents.

The development of curriculum passes through the following process:

- The syllabi are prepared keeping in mind the current developments, need based curriculum and feed backs.
- The syllabi are discussed in departmental meetings which are held at regular intervals before the meeting of Board of Studies.
- The final syllabi prepared by the departments are put before the Board of Studies, where these are thoroughly discussed and passed.
- The recommendations of the Board of Studies of various departments are placed before the Academic Council for approval. The Academic Council is chaired by Principal and comprises of Deans of various faculties, Heads of Departments and experts from different fields as per UGC guidelines.
- The recommendations of Academic Council are placed before the Governing Body for final approval. Syllabi are notified after the final approval of governing body.

Feedback: The college obtains feedback from students, teachers and other stakeholders about curricula. Principal gets feedback by interacting with students in the class rooms or students can submit the feedback to the Principal directly.

The experts from industry, members of civil society and research scholars are members of various Boards of Studies, Academic Council and Governing Body of the college. Their suggestions are given due consideration in the design and development of curricula.

The college believes that education should focus on fostering innovation by putting curiosity, critical thinking, deep understanding of the rules and tools of enquiry and creative brainstorming at the centre of curriculum. To spur an innovative mindset the college offers the following tools and experiences:

- Project based learning.
- > Concept based teaching by giving assignments to students.
- ➢ Teaching of skills.
- > Team work through subject societies.
- Use of thinking tools by organizing Quizzes, Debates, Power Point Presentations etc.
- Use of creative tools by involving students in Poster Making, Art and Craft competitions and writing articles for the college magazine 'Darbar'.

 - Projects in PG classes: PG classes in all the science streams have research projects with dissertations/assignments/presentations.
 - Workshops and Seminars: Apart from projects, summer training camps, workshops and seminars are part of curricula design.
- **1.1.5** How does college ensure that the curriculum developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional/national developmental needs?
- **Societal Needs:** The various curricula have been designed keeping in mind the needs of society in the fields of agriculture, food science, physiotherapy, biotechnology, computer and IT sector, chemical industry, education, trade service and industry sectors.
- **Farmers' Interest:** The needs of farming community are being fulfilled by various degree and diploma courses like M.Sc. (Agriculture, Horticulture, and Agronomy) and B.Sc. Agriculture, B.Sc. Food Science and Technology. New courses have been introduced in Soil Science, Vegetable Sciences, Entomology, Landscaping and Seed Production Technology. The curricula of these courses are based upon the guidelines of ICAR.
- A Soil Testing Laboratory has been set up with the help of Ministry of National Food Security, Government of India, keeping in mind the needs of farmers of the region.
- A Weather Station has also been installed in the college.
- **Ecology Issues:** The curricula of the college also focus on the ecology and environment related aspects. In second year of all three year degree courses, a paper on Environment Studies has been made compulsory.
- **Pharmaceutical Industry** needs have been met by introducing M.Sc. Pharmaceutical Chemistry.

For UG courses, the ordinance of affiliating university is followed. Each UG course (Science, Arts and Commerce) has five core subjects including languages (Punjabi and English) as compulsory subjects.

- The elective options are available in all M. Phil programs, Masters (English, Economics, Commerce, and Agriculture), Graduation Programs (Commerce Regular, Commerce Hons, Professional, BBA, BA Social Sciences) and all BA courses.
- In B.A., 16 elective papers are offered.
- In B.Sc. Agriculture (Hons.), 10 elective papers are offered.

(b) Enrichment Courses

The college has introduced following enrichment courses viz.

- Certificate course in Urdu.
- Certificate course in Spoken English and IELTS.
- Certificate course in Computerized Accounting.
- Certificate course in Seed Production Technology.
- Certificate course in Landscaping.
- P.G. Diploma in Fashion Designing and Garment Construction.

(c) Courses offered in modular form

The college is in the process of introducing some courses in modular form from the next session.

(d) Credit transfer and accumulation facility

At present percentage system is being followed in all the courses as per the affiliating University rules. The credit system is under consideration.

(e) Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programs and courses

Lateral mobility is governed by affiliating University rules and is allowed within stipulated time across programs. However lateral and vertical mobility across courses is not allowed by the affiliating university.

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for revision of the existing programs? What percentage of courses underwent a major syllabus revision?

- The Boards of studies in all departments meet twice a year to review the syllabi and curricula of programs.
- About 10-20% syllabi of almost all courses have undergone change. However in Agriculture 80% of the syllabi have been changed in accordance with the guidelines of ICAR

1.3.4 What are the value added courses offered by the college and how does the college ensure that all students have access to them?

The value added courses viz. Certificate Course in Computerized Accounting, Computer Applications, P.G. Diploma in Garment Construction and Fashion Designing, Diploma in Seed Production, Landscaping, Retail management and Diploma in Computerized Accounting are being offered by the college. Students have access to these courses through college website, pamphlets, college prospectus, notice boards, class announcements and news paper advertisements.

1.4.1 Does the college have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

The college has introduced tutorial groups to obtain the feedback from the students not only for the curriculum but also for overall feedback regarding all issues concerning the students. The feedback is also obtained from outgoing students at the time of convocation on the prescribed performa. The tutors submit the report of their tutorial groups to the office and a comprehensive report is prepared by the Principal's office which is subsequently discussed in the meeting of the departments for the ramification of deficiencies in the curriculum. The issues referred are discussed with the experts and faculty members in the respective Board of Studies for final decisions.

1.4.2 Does the college elicit feedback on the curriculum from national and international faculty? If yes, specify a few methods adopted to do the same (conducting seminars, workshop, online forum discussion etc.). Give details of the impact on such feedback.

The college has been conferred Autonomous Status. The curriculum for various courses was adopted from affiliating University and initially some changes (10-20%) were suggested by various stakeholders which have been implemented in subsequent years. The college is in process of sending various curricula to the experts from central and other Universities and taking the feedback for further improvement in the syllabi.

CRITERION II TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Students Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

A transparent procedure is followed for admitting students to various academic programs. The publicity is ensured through:

- Advertisement in national and regional newspapers, Local radio channels (FM) and on Cable T.V. channels.
- Extending information through updated college website www.khalsacollege.edu.in.
- Providing complete information through college prospectus.
- Displaying banners/hoardings at various places.
- Hand bills in local and regional newspapers.
- Visits to various schools by groups of teachers for the publicity of different courses.
- Career Guidance Seminars for school and college students
- Career guide booklet published by college and distributed among the students and various institutions.
- A complete transparency and secrecy is observed at every level in the admission process. The admission to various courses is governed by set procedures and rules.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place for UG, PG and Ph.D. programs by the college. Explain the criteria for admission (Ex. (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) others followed by the College?

Admission schedule is prepared for every session and published in college prospectus. The admissions of students to different programs in the college are made as per one of the following criteria:

1. Admission based on entrance test basis: M.Sc. Agriculture (Agronomy/ Horticulture/Agri. Economics/Soil Science/Vegetable Science/Entomology), M.Sc. (Physics/ Chemistry/Pharmaceutical Chemistry), M.Phil. (English/ Punjabi/Political Science and Commerce) and UG courses viz. B.Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture, Food Science and Technology, Physiotherapy, Physics, Chemistry are based on entrance test.

2. Merit basis: The students to the postgraduate courses M.Sc. (Botany, Zoology, Biotechnology, Food Science and Technology), MPT (Cardiopulmonary) and to under graduate courses of B.A. (Hons.) English and Punjabi, B.Sc.

(Biotechnology) and B.A. (Social Sciences) are admitted on the basis of merit and marks obtained in the qualifying class.

3. First come first serve basis: Admission to all other courses is based on first come first serve basis. The cut off percentage is usually above the minimum qualifying eligibility percentage set by the university.

- 2.1.3 Does the college have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?
- Principal of the college receives inputs from admission committees as well as students/ parents. These inputs are discussed and reviewed in the meeting of Heads of departments and all required measures are taken.
- The college admission committees are constituted each year under the convenorship of senior faculty members to review the entire admission process thoroughly. The progress is monitored by the Principal, Dean Academic Affairs and Registrar.
- Based on the admission committee reviews, the admission to M.Sc.(Physics) and M.Sc.(Chemistry) was conducted through entrance test for the session 2016-17, whereas the admission was based on merit basis earlier.
- Student profile analysis is done every year. This has helped in:
 - (i) Making admission process fully transparent.
 - (ii) Considerable increase in intake of girl students.
 - (iii) Attracting students from other states.
 - (iv) Providing fee concession to attract meritorious students.

2.1.4 What are the strategies adopted to increase/improve access to students belonging to the following categories?

- (a) SC/ST: College encourages the students from SC/ST categories by providing them the financial assistance as per government rules in all programs.
- (b) OBC (other backward classes) Fee concession and scholarships are provided to the OBC students as per government rules.

- Equal opportunities are given to girl students.
- Almost 50% of the students in the college are girls.
- The college has also started co-education in B.A. Classes w.e.f. academic session 2007-08.
- CCTV cameras are installed in the campus to curb the menace of eve teasing.
- Separate hostels for girl students.

• Establishment of Women Grievances Redressal Cell.

(d) Differently-abled

- Equal opportunities are available for differently abled students.
- Special financial assistance is also provided to needy disabled students.
- Wheel chairs are available.
- Lifts in new building.
- Classes at ground floor for physically challenged students.

(e) Economically-weaker sections

- There are fee-concessions, book bank and other related study material and fee installment scheme.
- The college maintains the list of economically weaker students and efforts are made to arrange scholarships/financial help from different sources.

(f) Sports personnel

- Sports personnel are given fee concessions, free accommodation, free meals, free sports equipment, kits and free refreshment etc.
- (g) Any other (specify)
- There is provision for fee installment scheme and fee concessions for students who participate and excel in academic, youth, sports and cultural activities.
- Total fee concession is given to the university toppers.
- Fee concession is also given to the college toppers.

2.2 Catering to Student diversity

2.2.1 Does the college organize orientation/induction program for freshers? If yes, give details of the duration of program, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

The college organizes orientations/induction programs for freshers at the college level and at the departmental levels.

- Since orientation/induction programs play a critical role in shaping student perception of what the college has to offer and helps the student to settle down. In the first week of the session, the Principal addresses new students faculty wise. He makes them aware of the rich, glorious heritage of the college, objectives of founding fathers at the time of establishment, traditions of the college, courses offered, campus culture, core values of the college, students support system and co-curricular activities.
- Issues covered include: syllabi, library, e-governance, course plan, academic calendar and research facilities, the examination system, internal assessment criteria, seminars, projects, maintenance of discipline and cleanliness in the college and other necessary instructions.
- At the time of admission, a short film about the profile of the college is shown to the students highlighting the achievements of the faculty, students and alumni. The slide show displays all relevant information of interest to the students.
- The Heads, Deans and Senior Teachers also conduct the orientation programs for students to make them aware about history of the concerned departments, course objectives, available resources and infrastructure, subject societies, attendance and leave rules.
- The suggestions from students are taken and after proper analysis, the strategies for further improvement are evolved.
- Discussion of the Senior Teachers and Heads with the Principal is held for the improvement of the orientation/induction programs.
- 2.2.2 Does the college have a mechanism through which the differential requirements of student population are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?
- The Principal holds meetings with all the Heads of departments after the admission and before the commencement of classes to plan strategies to address the different requirements of students. The requirements are identified by the teachers on admission duty/counseling committee at the time of admission and reported to the concerned heads. The following measures have been taken:
 - ➢ Gender sensitization through lectures.
 - Arranging remedial classes to help students with poor academic performance to cover deficiencies.
 - Adopting of bilingual teaching to cater to the inadequacy in English competence.

- Regular counseling and mentoring sessions are held to help the students to overcome their psychological problems and achieve their goals successfully.
- The college conducts remedial classes, extra theory and practical classes for slow learners.
- Teachers motivate such students in their vernacular language.
- Physically challenged students are provided classes on the ground floor.

These measures make the learners feel educationally, financially and socially comfortable in the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

- The advanced learners are identified by the concerned faculty based on: (i) Student profile (ii) Performance in house tests and semester examinations (iii) Student teacher interactions (iv) Class room response, class tests and assignments.
- Research aptitude among advanced learners is given a thrust by providing them an access to research journals, by giving inputs on reference skills, research methodology, and research design.
- The students are intellectually stimulated with advanced projects, challenging

assignments and tasks for their advancement.

- The students are encouraged to present papers, write research articles and assist in preparation of college magazine as student editors.
- Class representation is given to the students for pro-active leadership through which class room dynamics are positively influenced.
- The students are given the lead to plan and organize fests/events and departmental functions. This gives them opportunity to interface with the academic and industry experts.
- The students are encouraged to represent the college in inter-collegiate events/youth festivals at State/ National level, thus fostering their competitive spirits.
- Library books, reference books, text books, journals are provided to the advanced learners as per their need.
- There is a Toppers Club in the college which comprises of the toppers of all the classes.
- Regular meetings with toppers are held where, suggestions and feedback is sought.
- 2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college fosters an inclusive academic ambience for differently abled. An assessment is made for their special needs and they are provided with the following facilities:

- Mobility devices like wheelchairs.
- Lift in new building structures.
- Care is taken to allot ground floor class rooms.
- Class teachers and class mates play an important role in creating a comfort zone for such students.

2.3. Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation Schedules are planned on the basis of academic calendar which is prepared prior to the commencement of new academic session, in consultation with departments and other academic bodies.

- To make teaching effective, syllabi of each class are divided term wise keeping in view the semester and annual examination system.
- Time table prepared by the constituted committee is uploaded on the college website before the commencement of the classes.
- Workload division is distributed by Heads of departments.

- House tests, mid semester examination including practical tests, group discussions, seminars, projects, quiz etc. as applicable, are conducted for assessment of students. Teachers split the syllabi as per the requirement and prepare the teaching plan which is communicated to the student. Thus each department has a well defined semester plan and monthly plan to ensure smooth functioning.
- At the end of the final semester the results are announced as per schedule.
- The extracurricular activities are also incorporated in the academic calendar.
- The academic calendar is printed in the college prospectus. The prospectus is available to the students and the faculty at the beginning of the session.

- **2.3.2** Does the college provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?
- Before the commencement of academic session the course outlines and course schedules are available on college website. They are also provided by the teachers in their respective classrooms and displayed on Notice Boards indicating the course to be covered before and after mid semester test.
- Heads of the departments ensure the effectiveness of process in the departmental meetings.
- 2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?
- The faculty members make use of blend of technology and conventional lecture methods to provide indepth understanding of the subject to the students. Thus judicious mix of lecture method and ICT based teaching is adopted. Lecture method assisted by Audio-Visual Aids, use of Charts, Models, Slides, OHP, Transparencies, Power Point Presentations, Debates, Quizzes, Seminars, Workshops, Group Discussions, Assignments and Tutorials are a regular feature in class room teaching and learning.
- 2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.
- Individual Activities: The college has made conscious effort to shift from traditional teacher centre approach to student centric. Experimental learning, participative learning, problem solving methodologies are used to enhance learning of students. The teacher as facilitator plays a vital role in knowledge management and skill development through following activities :
 - College organizes student centric seminars/paper presentations, declamation contests, poster making competitions and Internships.
 - Students are encouraged and motivated to be student editors of various sections of college magazine 'Darbar'.
- Group Activities: Tutorial, group discussions, organizing exhibitions, interdepartmental and inter-college competitions, documentary, short film making, field survey, outdoor photography, quizzes, fine art competitions, excursions, industrial visits, educational tours, National level competitions/workshops.
- Subject Societies/Clubs: Subject societies and clubs (with students as Presidents/Vice Presidents and Secretaries) to facilitate the creative and academic pursuits of the students individually and collectively. Collaborative learning, team spirit and organizational skills are promoted by societies and

clubs.

- Book Fairs and Exhibitions are organised to inculcate the book reading habit so as to promote critical and evaluative skills.
- Tree Plantation Drives and Blood Donation Camps by NSS and NCC promote environmental concern and humanitarian spirit among students.
- Lectures and workshops for career guidance and personality development classes to develop and improve soft skills in students.
- Library timings are also increased.

2.3.5 What is the college policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

Every department on an average conducts two/three lectures each semester by inviting experts as per schedule prepared in the academic calendar. A budget is embarked for the same. National and state level seminars are conducted by inviting eminent resource persons from reputed National and International Institutes/Universities/Research bodies/Social circle. Each department in consultation with the Principal chooses the resource persons.

- 2.3.6. What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc. The following technologies and facilities are used by the faculty for effective teaching:
- All departments are well equipped with ICT- enabled facilities for teaching like OHP, LCD Projectors and Internet facility.
- A well equipped Mass Communication studio is available for training students in Production, Film editing, Film Shooting, Online editing etc.
- English language laboratory is equipped with DVD players, Computers, and CDs that are used for screening films, plays so as to equip the learners of English with good command of language for communication skills.
- Faculty makes use of all the latest gadgets viz. (multimedia projectors, power point presentation, OHP, LCD Projectors, internet facility DVD, CDs etc.
- The students are asked to collect the latest information from internet and quote the references of websites.
- The research data are analyzed with the help of latest softwares.
- Application of accounting softwares (BUSY and TALLY) by the students for learning computerized accounting.
- Computerized photo micrograph to explore the finer details and their use in research projects of the students.
- Virtual laboratories/ Smart class rooms.

- e-learning: The lectures on different topics are uploaded on the website for the students.
- Use of NPETL services.
- Inflibnet facility is provided.
- 2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psychosocio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.
- Class teachers are appointed as mentors for each class for academic purposes. Besides this Dean Academic Affairs, Deans of Faculties, Dean Students Welfare (Boys and Girls), Hostel Wardens conduct regular counselling sessions and provide guidance to the students.
- Post graduate students act as mentors of under graduate students.
- Women grievance cell plays an important role in guiding girl students.
- NSS camps provide guidance about community service.
- The teachers of department of psychology serve as mentors/advisors/guides and provide personal and psycho-socio guidance.
- 2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? The college expects the faculty to keep themselves updated about the latest trends in the growing technology and also the development in the field they teach or their respective subjects for this:

- They are often encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and share their knowledge with fellow faculty members and students. The faculty is also motivated to make use of latest teaching methods like using power point presentations for delivering lectures. Moreover the computer laboratories of the college are updated and faculty uses laboratories to improve their teaching efficiency.
- All departments have internet facility and faculty has access to it. Teachers imply alternative methods of teaching such as power point presentations, charts, graphs, syllabus related film screening in order to enhance quality of teaching learning process.
- Research projects in some departments are included in the curriculum that promote research orientation among students.
- Feedback from students is taken and is analyzed and suggestion are implemented.
- At the time of annual convocation the services of faculty are given due recognition and appreciation by the authorities.

2.3.9 How does the college create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

Innovation or creativity is instilled through:

- Lectures on research methodology.
- Various events at college level like Tech-Fest, Comm-Fest, Literary Sabha, Talent search, sports and subject societies.
- National Science Day is celebrated every year in which various activities viz. quiz competitions, poster presentation, collage making, Rangoli making, debates, declamation contest are held.
- Motivating students to participate in quiz/debates/declamation/poster presentation competitions in other colleges.
- Power presentations, project/assignments/seminars that have weightage in evaluation.
- Encouraging students to develop leadership skills, explore creativity and enhance scientific temper through creative writing, workshops and language competitions.

- Faculty members play an important role in facilitating such projects by guiding, supervising and defining the problem. They help the students in analyzing the problem and executing the project by providing library, internet facilities and helping in preparing dissertations/thesis etc.
- The college provides required facilities to the students to carry out these projects.

2.3.11 What efforts are made to facilitate the faculty in learning / handling computer-aided teaching/ learning materials? What are the facilities available in the college for such efforts?

- The teachers are familiar with appropriate tools to upload the study material on college server as per requirement of e-governance program. This e-learning tool has tremendously contributed towards holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.
- The college has centralized computer laboratories sponsored by UGC/CPE Scheme, 326 computers, 19 multimedia projectors, 08 Smart Boards, 02 OHP, 09 computer laboratories and internet facility in all departments.
- Systems are periodically updated making it convenient for the faculty to use latest applications.
- Data entry operator and laboratory assistants in the departments assist faculty members to overcome technical hassles.
- Informal feedback is also received through interaction with students by the Administration/Principal of the college.
- The Principal also has one to one interaction with faculty wherein suitable suggestions are given.

2.3.12 Does the college have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students/alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process?

- The students are a vital part of teaching evaluation process. The students fill teacher's feedback pro-forma to evaluate teachers on various aspects such as punctuality, subject knowledge, communication skills, innovative approach etc. The feedback is confidentially analyzed by the Principal with the help of the Dean Academic Affairs and senior faculty members, suggesting suitable remedial methods for streamlining the teaching learning process.
- Informal feedback is also received through interactions with the students by the Administration/Principal of the college.
- The Principal also has one to one interaction with faculty wherein suitable suggestions are given.
- The alumni are welcome to give their opinion about the college by filling a feedback pro-forma during alumni meet. It is also available on college website <u>www.khalsacollege.edu.in</u>.
- Alumni interact with the teachers during alumni meet.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The curriculum is finished within stipulated time mentioned in the academic calendar. The timely completion of curriculum is regularly supervised by the respective Head of the department and Dean of the faculty. However, contingency measures are taken to meet the disruptions in schedule due to unforeseen circumstances. If the need be, the faculty takes responsibility to put in extra hours to complete the curriculum in time schedule. In case of loss of working days due to disturbances, vacations are reduced and even examination is held on Sundays and holidays.

2.3.14 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The college has well stocked central library and departmental libraries to cater to the needs of students and faculty.
- The library is well equipped with text and reference books in all disciplines, available for students.
- The college main library has seating capacity for 162 students. There are 1,89, 302 text books 2,597 reference books, 485 rare books, 800 e-books, 36 magazines, 590 manuscripts, 314 encyclopedia, 124 journals and 316 CD and videos.
- Book exhibitions on campus facilitate students/teachers to select required books. There is a library committee for the purchase of new books, as per requirements of students and teachers. Every year sufficient amount is marked for purchase of books in library.
- Majority of the post graduate departments have departmental libraries.
- To provide effective utilization the main library remains open from 8.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. The reading room facility is available for the students. Reference section is also available with 2597 books. The journal section is available in the central library and departmental libraries with 124 journals. Apart from the text books, library also has books related to syllabus, encyclopedias, e-journals, competitive examination books, research journals and magazines, internet facility, inflibnet, xerox facility, back volumes of journals, and newspapers.
- Sikh History and Research Department houses rare and old books which have been microfilmed.
- Teachers can also have reading materials from online sources like e-books and journals.
- All the books are bar coded. Latest books, journals, research reports and other research material is also provided to the students and faculty.
- A separate section houses reference books.

- Students are allowed to retain books for exams by depositing security.
- Book Bank facility is available for economically disadvantaged students.

2.3.15 How does the institution continuously monitor, evaluate and report on the quality of teaching, teaching methods used, classroom environments and the effect on student performance?

- The academic calendar is prepared before the commencement of session and distributed among faculty.
- The teachers prepare course plan for the semester and spell out the specific learning objectives for each course.
- The progress is monitored in the departmental meetings.
- The teachers are required to submit self appraisal performa to the principal at the end of the each session enumerating the teaching learning objectives and teaching method used.
- The IQAC in its meetings analyzes various parameters affecting the quality of teaching and give suggestions for the further improvement.
- The academic audit committee conducts the audit of all the departments regularly.
- The meeting of Deans of various faculties and HoDs are convened regularly to analyze the academic and other issues and formulate the ways to improve quality of teaching and students performance.
- The feedback from the students regarding the quality of teaching and teaching methods is assessed by the authorities regularly.
- Each class has a teacher incharge and student representative for ensuring the conducive class room environment.
- The continuous evaluation of students is done through class tests, mid semester examination and end semester examination.
- The weak students are identified and assisted with mentoring, remedial classes and individual attention.

2.4.2 How are the members of the faculty selected?

• There are four types of posts in the college viz., (i) Grant-in aid, (ii) Management Permanent and (iii) Adhoc (iv) Contract basis.

Members of the faculty are selected by the criteria laid down by DPI/GNDU/UGC/Punjab Government for different categories. The existing vacancies are advertised by the college in leading regional and English newspapers inviting applications for eligible candidates. The notification is also put up on the college website.

- All the applications are screened as per criteria of DPI/UGC and the shortlisted eligible candidates are informed to attend interview along with original certificate.
- The shortlisted eligible candidates are interviewed by selection committee comprising of subject experts nominated by affiliating university and DPI, representatives of GNDU and DPI, Principal and Honorary Secretary of Khalsa College Charitable Society.
- The selection of the candidates in the interview is based on objective evaluation with the following parameters:
 - Academic Qualifications
 - Teaching Experience
 - Performance in Interview
 - Teaching Aptitude

• The college has required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses. Punjab Government/DPI freezed the recruitment of posts in 2004 and allowed the college to fill vacant posts on contractual basis as per the order of Punjab and Haryana High Court in 2014. During the last two years 50 teachers were appointed on contractual basis in addition to 52

working on regular/permanent basis against 139 posts sanctioned by Punjab Government. Additional workload is compensated by filling the posts by the management on regular/adhoc basis. At present, 16 faculty members are on management posts, 183 faculty members are working on adhoc basis and three members on part time basis.

- Duty leave is granted to the faculty who want to pursue M.Phil./PhD.
- Leave is also granted to attend refresher/orientation courses as per requirement of the faculty. 29 faculty members have attended refresher

courses, 5 GOC courses and 38 winter/summer schools courses during last four years.

- The college also encourages faculty to be members of National and International academic research bodies.
- Faculty is honoured on completion of Ph.D. and academic/research achievements on convocation/ Annual day.

The college aims at quality education and recognizes importance of innovation in teaching and learning. The faculties are rewarded for innovations as per the college norms. In the recent past a number of innovative practices have been introduced by the college:

- Introduction of internal assessment in all UG and PG diploma courses except BPT.
- Introduction of tutorial group meetings to obtain feedback from students with the help of interaction.
- Use of ICT teaching learning.
- Introduction of e-governance to make the administrative and academic working more effective. Seminars and conferences are organized to interact with academicians and eminent scholars.

2.4.14 Does the college have a mechanism to encourage

University rules do not permit the exchange of faculty between institution for teaching. However, the teachers frequently visit other institutions as resource persons to deliver extension lecture etc.

- The college is preparing a proposal for faculty and student programs with German Colleges/Universities.
- The college provides mobility by sanctioning leave from higher studies, doctoral or post doctoral research work.

- Academic calendar is uploaded on website at the beginning of the session.
- Scheme of each course for examination is communicated to the students through website.
- Examination schedules, date sheet and results for all the courses are displayed on website for all the stakeholders.
- The students, teachers and parents are made aware through various meetings.
- The results of the House Tests are displayed on the notice boards.
- The college also conducts meetings with parents to apprise them about the performance of their wards in the academic and other activities.
- The students are provided information regarding the rules of re-evaluation.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the college and to what extent have they been implemented in the college? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?
- The advent of autonomy introduced major examination reforms in the college.
- College was conferred autonomous status in July 2013. The college is conducting the examination and evaluation strictly according to UGC norms.
- Pre-autonomy where the examination system was governed by Guru Nanak Dev University, the scope for continuous assignment, though not mandatory, was created through two term house/tests and regular class tests.
- College introduced continuous internal assessment system in all classes.
- Continuous internal assessments give the teacher a scope to periodically monitor the academic performance of the students and accordingly identify suitable and timely strategies for improvement.
- Autonomy has made different modes of evaluation available to the teacher.
- Results are declared within stipulated time.
- Transparency and scrutiny (Pre-audit) reflect the positive impact on the system.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

• The continuous evaluation of students is done by internal assessment, house examination, attendance, overall activity, curricular activity etc :

- The autonomous evaluation system enables the teacher to monitor the student performance and mentor him for improvement.
- Answer sheets of house examination are shown to students to understand the nature of mistakes committed. This gives the teachers a scope to discuss the paper with the students and give suggestions for improvement.
- Skill based tests which comprise of assignments, presentations, seminars in addition to practical exams, project and viva voce.

2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of the internal assessment process?

- The percentage earmarked for continuous internal assessment is 20%.
- The internal assessment is further calculated on the basis of criteria comprising of 10% House test, 6% Attendance, 4% Conduct/Extra Curricular Activities.
- Internal evaluation pattern is evolved by the Board of Studies concerned and approved by the Academic Council.
- Internal Assessment tests are centralized and are conducted as per schedule given in the Academic Calendar.
- Due weightage is given to attendance and extracurricular activities.

2.5.5 Does the college adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

- The college adheres to the examination schedule once it is uploaded on the website. The dates are rescheduled only due to unavoidable circumstances. Under such circumstances the change is conveyed to the students via SMS and college website.

 - 2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes? Pre-examination processes–Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads,

attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc. Examination process– Examination material management, logistics. Post examination process–attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

The college has an integrated platform for examination process. The entire examination process is monitored by Controller of Examination (COE). The office of Controller of examination is assisted by the Registrar for the smooth conduct of examination related process. All the pre examination, and post examination processes are well established and maintained through a specially designed integrated software.

Pre-examination processes:

- Under semester system the college holds final examination in Nov./Dec. for odd semesters and in May for even semesters.
- The panel of external examiners is suggested by head of department and approved by BoS of departments. Final selection is done by the controller of examination. Complete confidentiality is observed in all respects. The paper setters are given well defined guidelines and are asked to prepare two sets of question papers.
- Dates for submission of examination forms are displayed on different notice boards and on website three months before the start of theory examinations. These examination forms are scrutinized by the concerned personnel of establishment and registration branch on the basis of which examination roll numbers along with photograph is generated.
- Examination time table (Date sheet) is displayed on different notice boards and also on website as well. It is ensured that the strength of each examination centre remains approximate 300.
- Lists of Superintendents, Deputy Superintendents and Invigilators are circulated a week before the commencement of examination. Cut list and attendance chart with candidates photograph are generated and sent to the centre. Invigilators get signature of candidate after verification, so that impersonation case is detected.
- For effective and smooth conduct of examination searching and screening teams are constituted for every examination centre so that the candidate does not carry any incriminating materials and electronic device. Jammers have also been installed in every examination centre.
- Flying Squad teams comprising of teachers are constituted.
- Computerized seating arrangement is prepared by concerned clerk under supervision of centre superintendent of each centre a day before and is displayed outside every centre and respective rooms.

• The staff meetings regarding smooth running of examination are held by the Principal and the Controller of examinations before the commencement of examination.

Examination process:

- The examination cell gets the answer sheets printed with serial code and are kept in strong room.
- The examination process is well coordinated by the examination branch. COE looks into the examination centre, seating arrangement, invigilator schedule, attendance and particulars.
- The answer books and question papers made ready before the commencement of examination.
- Computerized seating arrangement is made by concerned clerk under supervision of centre superintendent of each centre a day before and is displayed outside every centre and respective rooms.
- Separate seating arrangement for students with disability is made.
- Medical help if required is provided through college doctor. Proper arrangement for water and toilets is made in each centre.
- The staff engaged in examination process is paid honorarium on university pattern.

Post Examination:

- After the examination the answer sheets are coded and then evaluated and award lists are tabulated and computerized.
- The evaluated answer sheets along-with award lists are collected by the examination branch within 15-20 days. Internal assessment and external marks are recorded and final marks are generated and verified manually.
- Result sheets are generated and thoroughly checked, reviewed and verified before the results are declared.
- Results are uploaded on website and hard copy of the gazettes is displayed on notice boards. The students can download their results online and can apply for re-evaluation after which DMCs are generated and distributed to the students.

2.5.8 Has the college introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

- The affiliating university does not allow the college teachers to supervise the Ph.D program. However, the teachers of Department of Agriculture are allowed to become Ph.D guides.
- 2.5.9 What efforts are made by the college to streamline the operations at the office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the

examination division/section?

- The COE heads the examination, secrecy and conduct branches which are responsible for holding all the examination related processes.
- The secrecy and the concerned section for conducting the examination is housed in newly built administrative block.
- All the examination processes relating to registration, allotment of roll numbers, compilation and declaration of results are conducted through a specially designed software.
- All these efforts have significantly improved the processes and functions of the examination cell.

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

- The college has an effective mechanism for redressal of grievances pertaining to examinations. All grievances related to examination are promptly addressed by COE as per the stipulated norms.
- In case of grievance to end semester examination there is provision for reevaluation.
- Grievances related to anomaly in the question papers are resolved through a committee constituted by the Principal. The committee looks into the complaints and recommends necessary steps to redress them.
- The students can appeal to the Chief Controller of Examinations (Principal), if not satisfied with the decision of the committee.
- Students' feedback is taken every year and suggestion boxes are also put up for the redressal of grievances.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

- The learning outcomes/objectives are clearly stated for each course when the course content is being prepared. Then it is passed through the BoS and Academic Council.
- The college website is a vital and reliable source of information about academic aspect of the college and is regularly updated.
- The course content and the learning outcomes are made available in the prospectus.
- Orientation programs are conducted for freshers at the beginning of the session.
- Program-wise charts are prepared and are displayed at the time of admission.

- Regular career counseling lectures are organized for making students and staff aware of future opportunities.
- The class tests and assignments are regularly given and the marks are recorded that act as ready reference for monitoring the academic progress of the students.
- The faculty members are encouraged to conduct surprise tests, oral tests, to monitor academic progress of each student.
- Parents and guardians are kept informed about academic progress of their wards.
- Success in competitive exams, placement record, and feedback from alumni regarding their employment ensures the achievement of learning outcome.
- The students are encouraged to attend inter college competitions, workshops and seminars to compare their learning outcomes with that of others.
- The college magazines and newsletters are source of dissemination of information to students.

2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Achievements of learning is monitored through:

- Continuous internal assessment.
- Tutorial groups seeking information regarding the deficiencies in the learning outcomes.
- Feedback from the students.

2.6.3 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for overcoming barriers of learning?

- The college collects and analyzes data on student learning outcome through class tests, house examinations and tutorials.
- The previous years results of various classes and the data collected by the result performance of students through departments, the calculative percentage is analyzed and discussed in the meeting of Staff, HODs and Principal and necessary actions are taken to overcome the barriers of the learning.
- Students inadequacies in meeting the learning outcomes are dealt proactively through counseling and remedial classes for improvement in examinations.

- To set up research centres for each faculty.
- To make campus Wi-Fi.
- To collaborate with other agencies.
- To start publication of research journals.

Impact of Recommendations:

The impact of these recommendations is as follows:

- New research laboratories have been established in different departments.
- More faculty members got involved in research activities. As a result, the number of sanctioned major and minor research projects, research papers and books has increased.

- Faculty members and post-graduate students are publishing their research reports in research journals (Sanvad and Current Reports in Science and Technology), published by college (with ISSN numbers).
- Research based project work has been introduced at graduate and postgraduate level in science, commerce and agriculture departments.
- Research degree Program of M.Phil. have been started 2015-16 by the Departments of English, Commerce, Political Science and Punjabi.
- Internet facility in the campus provides access to advanced books and journals for research work.

3.1.2 What is the policy of the college to promote research culture in the college?

The college after achieving the autonomous status has moved forward towards inculcating the spirit of research amongst its faculty and students. The following are the main policy guidelines for promoting research in the college:

- To introduce research degree Program in the college which includes starting of M.Phil. in all streams.
- Every research article/paper or thesis submitted should accompany a self declaration performa to establish non plagiarism by the author.
- Relaxation in workload of two periods/week to faculty members having major/minor research projects.
- Encourage the staff to attend seminars/conferences/workshops etc.

 - The college promotes interdisciplinary research through new courses and research publications and healthy interactions. The journal "Current Reports on Science and Technology" is an interdisciplinary journal published by faculty of sciences.
 - Dr. Amit Anand (Department of Chemistry) is involved in synthesizing organic moieties of biomedical and pharmaceutical importance, an interdisciplinary approach.
 - Sikh History Research Department of the college houses a reference library and a museum. It has a collection of 6416 books, 415 paintings/photographs, 602 manuscripts, newspapers (1904-1988), 505 file books and journals. The research scholars from World over visit this department to collect valuable information in the field of Sikh History, Punjabi Literature and Religious Studies.
 - The research lectures by experts are organized by all faculties of college and are attended by members from other departments.
 - The faculty and students involved in research use laboratories, equipments and other infrastructure of other departments frequently.

- The college aims at promoting research among faculty and students by providing resources and developing latest infrastructure facilities.
- New laboratories in Chemistry, Agriculture, Physics, Computer Science, Food Technology and Biotechnology have been set up to meet the needs of researchers.
- The laboratories have been upgraded with advance equipments like Flame Photometer, Spectrophotometer, BOD incubator, Multichannel Analyser, Single Channel Analyser, Scintillation Counter, IR Spectrometer and UV Spectrometer etc. in science departments.
- An advanced instrument Agilent 4200 Microwave Plasma Atomic Emission Spectrometre has been purchased for the Soil Science Lab of Department of Agriculture.
- The college has provided computers and internet facility to all the departments.
- The central library and departmental libraries are well stocked and computerized to facilitate research related activities.
- The centralized research centre has been upgraded in college.
- Two separate research centres are established by Agriculture and Commerce departments.

The research centre of the college, acts as the information resource centre to cater to the needs of the researchers. It provides information to the faculty for filing applications to funding agencies for research projects. The centre has internet facility. The research committee circulates UGC notices related to major and minor research projects from time to time.

The college has provision for residential facilities (with computer and internet) for research scholars and faculty and in boys and girls hostels.

Two specialised research centres for the faculties of Agriculture and Commerce & Business Administration are established by the college to address the challenges of research Programs. The research centres have provided thesis, synopsis, guidelines for research papers, back volume of journals, computer with internet facility and latest journals. In Agriculture department, research plot (5 acres) is especially reserved for students for their post graduate/doctoral research. Three (3) acres of land is devoted to nursery growing ornamental plants and flowers which is used for research and commercial purposes. 7 acres of land is devoted to orchards (Kinnow, falsa, peaches, plums and pear) grown organically for research purposes.

The Sikh History Research Department of the College has historical collections related to Sikh history from all over the world for the purpose of research. The rare manuscripts of the department library have provided references to the students pursuing Ph.D and M.Phil. degrees. The whole record of Sikh history department has been digitalized so that it could be preserved for the coming generations.

- Dissemination of information through web portal and mobile application containing useful information regarding crop production, weather and marketing of crops. Students installed these applications on the mobile phones of the farmers and also guided them regarding the use of these applications.

To inculcate qualities of leadership and humanity for the overall development of mind and body of the students, the college encourages the students to participate in extension activities. The college promotes the participation in extension activities by giving:

- Leave to attend camps etc.
- Honouring them during college functions
- Extra/remedial classes to cover the syllabus

The college promotes participation of faculty in extension activities by providing them leave and incentives. Three units of NCC (Air, Naval and Army Wings) are actively working in the college under the respective teacher incharges.

 - The college has been running a Lifelong Learning Center since April, 2015 in its premises where women from weaker section of the society are given free training in cutting, tailoring, printing, embroidery, household consumables and food processing. 98 female candidates received training in the centre from April, 2015 to December, 2016. The college has spent Rs. 1,19,677/- on providing infrastructure to this centre.
 - The children of labourers are provided free education by NSS volunteers and faculty members in this centre so as to ensure social justice and empower the underprivileged and most vulnerable section of the society. They are also provided free meals, clothing and footwear. Free medical checkup of these children is also carried out.
 - Gender Champion Club has been set up by the college to sensitize the students about the issues related to gender discrimination. Extension lectures are organized by the club for this purpose. Students from Gender Champion Club also participated in poster presentation and declamation contest held at college.
 - The Farmer Training Centre of the college caters to the community service to the rural people of the region. It imparts training to the rural community in various fields like mushroom cultivation, bee keeping, horticulture, organic farming, preparation of jams, pickles, squashes and dairy products etc. The centre conducts training camps specifically for the women with an aim to improve their socio-economic status. 183 camps have been organized for women during the last 5 years and more than 6,000 women participants have benefitted from these camps.

• Agents of Change Program has been initiated by department of Agriculture to sensitize the students about problems being faced by the people of rural areas in Punjab. 65 villages were covered in 2015-16 under this Program and information regarding their economic condition and other socio-economic problems was collected using pre-designed questionnaires through personal interview method.

3.6.5 Give details of awards/recognition received by the college for extension activities/community development work.

The extension activities/community development work of the college are highly appreciated by the beneficiaries and the community. Faculty members of the college have received awards from many organizations /institutes for such work. The NSS unit of the college has been honoured by Blood Bank of Guru Nanak Dev Hospital, Amritsar for conducting blood donation camps. NCC cadets of the college won gold, silver and bronze medals during various camps.

The aim of Khalsa College, since its inception, has been the eradication of ignorance and illiteracy along with enkindling a spirit of nationalism, social uplifting and religious commitment in the minds of its students. The extension activities undertaken by the college help in sensitizing the students about the issues of civic and social responsibility so as to inculcate moral values in them and to equip them with self-confidence, decision making, communication skills, leadership and teamwork skills, debate and declamation skills, organizational skills and practical knowledge problem solving ability as well in developing human approach to the needs of less fortunate section of the society. Before the start of the financial year, requirements are taken from the departments for upgrading infrastructure in view of starting of new courses and increasing number of students in various courses. The management ensures the adequate availability of physical infrastructure by allocating the budget for maintenance and construction.

To ensure the optimal utilization of the college infrastructure, the following measures are taken:

- The college remains open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- There is a centralised system for preparing the time table through which institute ensures the efficient utilisation of the academic buildings.
- Diplomas/certificate courses/add on courses are planned for afternoon.
- Library facility is available from 8:00 a.m.to 6:00 p.m. in routine. The library timings are extended and it is open even during examination days.
- Laboratories in Agriculture, Food Science and Technology, Computer and Science departments are well equipped to impart practical training to the students.
- Centralized computer laboratory facility is provided to the teachers for research.
- The health centre and its laboratory remains operational from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Beside this, the emergency services are available round the clock for hostel students and staff in residential quarters.
- The hostel occupancy is fully utilized with total intake of 1350 students.
- The gym facility is available in Boys hostel and in Physiotherapy department.
- The campus is also used for examination centres during vacations.
- The college provides infrastructure to conduct tests like UGC (NET), B.Ed., RRB, IIT, Police Recruitment etc.
- District administration utilizes college grounds for organising various State and District level events like sports competitions, cultural events and elections.

- Dispensary has required drugs and equipments. A new building of health centre has been constructed in physical space i.e. 1904 sq. feet. (28 x 68) with well lighted reception, patient waiting space, doctor room, drug storage space, a separate sterilization and dressing room, 5 beds with wall mounted oxygen supply and suction and attached bathrooms.
- OPD facilities are available for faculty and students. It is operational from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. In OPD emergency services are provided i.e. first aid, stabilization of condition of patient before referral, primary level management and referral of injuries, accident, animal bites and other emergencies.
- Rs. 2 to 3 Lac coverage is provided by the college through insurance policy for students.
- The Physiotherapy OPD provides services to patients suffering from various orthopedic, neurological, and traumatic conditions. On an average, 50 patients which include outdoor patients, staff and students visit the OPD daily. For the privacy of the patients, the Electrotherapy Unit of the OPD has been organized in separate cabins. The record of the patients visiting the OPD is maintained properly in the department.

- All computer labs are equipped with internet facility.
- There is Centralized Computer Laboratory under UGC-CPE grant with 60 computers and internet facility available to staff for research purpose.

- Experts opinion regarding deploying and upgrading IT infrastructure are taken from time to time.

- Teachers upload their lectures on e-governance site to which students can access through their user accounts.
- Library has online catalogue which facilitates the checking of status of books.
- Information regarding seminars and research activities is published on college website and e-governance website.
- Templates of paper invited for journals are available on website.
- The News Bulletin published by college is available on website for students.
- The Prospectus is available on college website.
- **4.3.5** Give details on the ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces available within the college and how they are utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning.
- There are nine computer laboratories, 150 computers with latest configuration connected to internet via 12 Mbps leased line.
- Language laboratory with clarity software for enhancing the language competencies in students has been set up.
- Research centre has been set up with latest hardware and software.
- College has total 17 ICT rooms.

4.3.6 How are the faculty facilitated to prepare computer aided teachinglearning materials? What are the facilities available in the College or affiliating University for such initiatives?

- The college teaching staff is encouraged to make use of ICT resources such as Computers, LCD, Multimedia Projectors, for preparing and giving powerpoint presentations.
- All the departments are equipped with computers, printers and multimedia projectors etc. Faculty members can make use of it as per their requirement.
- Centralized lab facility is available to faculty for research purposes.
- Faculties upload their lectures on e-governance (<u>www.kccsasr.org</u>) website so that the student may access the lectures online through their accounts.
- Faculty development programs are organized from time to time.

4.3.7 How are the computers and their accessories maintained? (AMC, etc.)

The college prefers to purchase branded computers and accessories. Maintenance of branded equipment is done by the company during the warranty period (1-2 years). After the warranty period is over, the college takes the service of its own maintenance cell established in Computer Science department. In case of major hardware problems, the college takes the services of hardware engineers from the market. AMC of the UPS has been done.

The college is using NPTEL service which is used extensively by faculty, researchers, staff and students for teaching and research.

The annual budget for update, deployment and maintenance of the computers in the college allotted by Management is Rs. 9,67,000/-. In addition, college also spends from Principal's funds as per the requirements of the departments.

During new construction and renovation work, special care is taken to preserve the existing heritage structure of building of college.

The Governing body has appointed Secretary (Buildings) for maintenance, repair and construction of new buildings.

The college has its own Works and Maintenance Department which is fully responsible for all repairs and maintenance. This department has a regular staff under the supervision of Project Officer.

CRITERION V STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1. Does the college have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

The college has a comprehensive system for supporting and mentoring the students for which a Career Guidance and Counseling Cell, and a Training and Placement Cell have been established. The support system functions through various heads like Dean Academic Affairs, Dean Agriculture, Dean Commerce, Dean Humanities, Dean Languages, Dean Sciences, Dean Research, Dean Cultural Activities, Dean Students Welfare (Boys and Girls), Women Redressal Committee and overall monitoring is done by the Principal. The system works in a coordinated manner to ensure the overall development of the students. The faculty members and administration continuously interact with the students about their academic and personal progress. The key activities of the system are:

- **Counseling**: At the entry level the students are individually counseled to make right choice of stream and subjects according to their interests and needs. For this purpose counseling committees are constituted at the time of admission which perform their duties from May to July along with admission committees. Counseling regarding the stress management and positive approach is provided by the department of psychology throughout the year. The religious classes and divinity lectures are also conducted.
- **Orientation**: In the beginning of the session the orientation of the students is conducted. Principal and Deans of the faculties address the students. Then in the respective departments, the students are oriented by the heads and teachers.
- **Tutorials**: The students are divided in small groups and each group is allotted to a tutor. Tutorial meetings are organized frequently for individual mentoring of the students. The tutorial group includes both junior and senior students for peer mentoring.

5.1.2 What provisions exist for academic mentoring apart from class room work?

Apart from classroom work, the students are mentored through the following teaching learning strategies:

- Various National/International seminars/conferences and extension lectures are organized by the departments which help the students in getting them acquainted with latest advances in their concerned subjects.
- Various subject societies are managed by the students under the supervision of head of department concerned as coordinator. These subject societies are

excellent platform for mentoring the students inculcating the organizational skills.

- Project work is a part of curriculum in P.G. and some U.G. classes. Students are supervised by teachers of the respective departments.
- Remedial classes for weak students are conducted. Extra classes for the beginners in Maths are also conducted in zero periods.
- To enhance practical knowledge, educational tours are conducted by different departments to industries and advanced research institutions.
- In sciences, P.G. students are made mentors for B.Sc. students. Every mentor is allotted group of 4-5 students. The mentor helps these students in theory as well as practical problems.
- Teachers mentor the students by motivating and encouraging them to participate in inter and intra college competitions.
- 5.1.3 Does the college provide personal enhancement and development schemes for students? If yes, describe techniques employed e.g., career counselling, soft skill development, etc.
- The college organizes classes for personality development in all departments.
- Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer literacy, etc.): Special classes are conducted to develop listening and speaking skills in English. A language lab is established to train the students in Phonetics and communication skills. Workshops are also organized by the computer department for computer literacy among the students.
- **Career Guidance Cell** of the college provides information to the students about the various career opportunities. The prominent activities of the cell are as following:
 - The cell organizes orientation programs about various courses before the commencement of the new session. The aim is to make the students aware about the new and ongoing courses in the college.
 - Lectures of experts from various fields are arranged for outgoing students.
 - Career guidance companies are engaged by the cell to organise seminars and workshops to guide the students about various aspects of personality development and interview skills. 500 students benefited from it.
 - State department and agencies like Department of Tourism Punjab and United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) are engaged to organize professional training Programs.
 - Famed career counselors Mr. Vaibhav Mehndiratta (PIBM), Mr. Rajeev Malhotra (IIBM), Mr. Nitin Aggarwal (CL) have contributed to the development of career consciousness among the students.

- **News Bulletin** is published annually. It contains news from all departments and college campus.
- **Sports Bulletin** is published and released on Annual Sports Day to acquaint the students with the rich sports heritage of the college and the contribution of the players to the country at the international, national, state and inter-varsity level.
- **The Annual Report** of the college is published and distributed to students with the degree on the Annual Convocation along with the convocation address by the Chief Guest.
- **Wall Magazines** are a regular feature of many departments. Students put up articles, poems, posters, cartoons etc. Relevant material is displayed on the wall magazines updating knowledge and sharing information.
- **College Profile** covering the history, activities, contribution and alumni of the college is published.

The college has generated **Poor Students Aid Fund**. Meritorious and needy students are given books from Book Bank of the college main library.

• Health centre, health insurance etc.

The college has full time residential doctor in the campus and support services like

- Referral services
- Direct treatment
- Day care
- Emergency Ambulance service to students and staff of the college.
- > Dispensary has required drugs and equipments
- A new building of health centre has been constructed in physical space i.e. 1904 sq. feet. (28 x 68) with well lighted reception, patient waiting space, doctor room, drug storage space, a separate sterilization and dressing room, 5 beds with wall mounted oxygen supply and suction and attached bathrooms.
- OPD facilities is available for faculty and students. It is operational from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. In OPD emergency services are provided i.e. first aid, stabilization of condition of patient before referral, primary level management and referral of injuries, accident, animal bites and other emergencies during OPD hours.
- Rs. 2 to 3 Lac coverage is provided by the college through insurance policy for students chronicle disease.
- The Physiotherapy OPD provides services to patients suffering from various orthopaedic, neurological, and traumatic conditions. On an average, 50 patients which include outdoor patients, staff and students visit the OPD daily. For the privacy of the patients, the Electrotherapy Unit of the OPD has been organized in separate cabins. The record of the patients visiting in the OPD is maintained properly in the department.
- Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer literacy, etc.) Spoken English: Special classes are conducted to develop listening and speaking skills in English. A language lab is established to train the students in Phonetics and communication skills. Department of Computer Science organizes workshops for computer literacy among students.
- **Department of Fashion Designing** organizes hobby classes in Cutting, Tailoring, Embroidery, Printing and Tie and Dye.
- **Department of Fine Arts** organizes Painting and Craft Workshops for the students
- **Department of Youth Welfare** organizes Theatre Workshops for the students.
- NSS organizes Disaster Management and Health Awareness programs.
- Performance enhancement for slow learners/students who are at risk of failure and dropouts: Remedial and extra classes are conducted to enhance the performance of slow learners. Personal attention is given to such students by the teachers.

- Exposure of students to other institutions of Higher learning/ Corporate/Business houses: Educational trips are a regular feature of every department. Industrial visits seminars/conferences are conducted. Experts are invited to deliver lectures.
- **Publication of student magazine**: The college encourages the students to publish their creative and research work in the college magazine: **Darbar**. It has different sections namely English, Punjabi, Hindi and Religious Studies. The student editors are appointed section wise under the teacher incharge.

The college has an independent Centre for the Coaching of Competitive Examinations. The centre has invited a number of resource persons in their specialised areas to share their personal experiences and provide practical learning during their interaction with the students.

The centre makes use of the latest equipments of teaching aids required for the smart classes. The library of the college has a special room where latest books on various competitions are kept for the benefit of the students. Latest journals, magazines and newspapers on competitions are also made available. The library also subscribes to Inflibnet.

A Placement Cell with a senior teacher as its director is established. Teachers from different departments are also members of this cell. Students are involved in the functioning of the placement cell. The following mechanism is adopted:

- Companies of national and international repute are invited for the placement. Students are identified as per the requirements of different companies.
- Notice regarding the visits and requirements of the companies is displayed on the notice board and served to all departments and hostels. SMS regarding this is also sent to all students.
- Special coaching classes are arranged for effective communication skills to face the interview panels.
- Lectures of experts to develop entrepreneurship are organized.
- The Job Festivals for campus selection are also held.
- The cell also maintains student feed-back data of the passed-out students.

- The Mohali chapter of Khalsa College Alumni Association purchased a land and donated to Khalsa College Governing Council to establish Khalsa College of Technology and Business Studies in Mohali. All the alumni of Mohali chapter are members of the local management committee of the college.
- In 2015, it was decided that Annual Alumni Meet would be organized on 5th March every year which is the foundation day of the college.

5.1.14 Does the college have a student grievance redressal cell? Give details of the nature of grievances reported and how they were redressed.

For welfare of the students and to address their grievances a Students Grievances Redressal Cell is established as per the recommendation of UGC. The grievances of the students are redressed as following:

• At Student Level

The grievances of the students as reported directly to the Principal/ Teachers or in tutorial groups are analyzed by committee constituted by the Principal. The issues at college level are resolved under the guidance of the Principal and at departmental level by the concerned Heads/Deans. Informal feedback from students is also taken by the Principal from time to time. To resolve any such issue related to students college has appointed Dean Students Welfare for both boys and girls.

- At Staff Level
 - To address grievances of staff, college has formed Grievance Appeal Committee.
 - Any complaint received from staff or/and student is immediately referred to the concerned committee. The redressal is done at the earliest.
 - ➢ No major grievances have been reported.

5.1.15 Does the college have a cell and mechanism to resolve issues of sexual harassment?

- The college has two student welfare committees: One for boys and one for girls to resolve issues of sexual harassment. Student can approach Dean Student Welfare (Boys), Dean Student Welfare (Girls) regarding complaints about sexual harassment. A special cell **Women Grievance Cell** under the convenership of Dr. Arvinder Kaur Kahlon is established to resolve the issues related to sexual harassment.
- A student welfare committee constituting Prof. Randhir Singh (Convener), Prof. Devender Singh (Registrar), Prof. Jagwinder Kaur, Prof. Sawraj Kaur, Prof. Satnam Singh, Prof. Supninderjit Kaur deals with issues of sexual harassment also. Another committee regarding grievances appeal committee is also constituted. The committee members are: Dr. M.S. Batra (Convener), Prof. Devender Singh (Registrar), Dr. Arvinder Kaur Kahlon, Prof. Sukhmeen Bedi, Prof. Gurdev Singh, Dr. Geetinder Maan, Dr. Surjit Kaur. The college has post of Dean Students Welfare (Girls) who looks after the welfare of the girl students. The students are asked to put their complaints in the complaint box or they can directly approach the committees. No such instance has been reported.
- The college has **adequate security arrangement** to ensure the safety and security of the staff and students. The security incharge is an ex-army personal with a team of 56 security men. Apart from this the CCTV cameras are installed in the whole campus, canteen and girls hostel.

At the commencement of every academic year the students are advised and warned against ragging. Since strict instructions are given by displaying posters in the college, no instance of ragging has been reported. Apart from this the college has also security arrangement in the campus and hostels to check such incidents.

5.1.17 How does the college elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation, etc. ?

All the stakeholders viz. parents, students, teachers and alumni contribute to strengthen academic and holistic development of the college.

Interactions with stakeholders

(a) Faculty: The Principal regularly organises staff meetings to apprise them about developments in the college. Feedback from staff members on academic and other student related issues are also taken.

(b) Students: Organising Tutorials is a regular feature of the college. During these tutorials the tutors update students about the recent developments in the college. They are also motivated to share the problems faced by them at department and college level. Apart from this, students can also meet the HODs, Deans and the Principal as and when required.

(c) **Parents:** Parent-teacher meets are organized to update parents about their ward's performance. Their feedback on college performance is also sought during these meets. Parents are also informed by mail about attendance record of their wards. In case of any indiscipline parents are called to discuss the matter.

(d) Society: Representatives of the various sections of the society are members of college statutory bodies. Their suggestions and feedback are considered while framing academic policy of the college.

• **Reinforcing culture of excellence:** College through its subject societies encourage the students to organise and manage various academic and non-academic activities. It helps in developing and polishing managerial skills of students. The college also organizes inter-college competitions in debate, declamation and quiz etc.

To motivate the students to excel in academics, the college honours those students who score above University toppers. 63 such students were honoured during the session 2015-16.

• Identifying needs and championing organizational development (OD): Regular feedback of the students in tutorials and at the time of convocation acts as a tool to identify the needs of the students and also the shortcomings of the administration from different perspectives. On identifying such needs college has taken various steps such as starting up of new employment oriented courses, setting up of better infrastructure, more drinking water points with RO facility, more spacious college dispensary, increased seating capacity of college's main library and setting up of new libraries in various departments. All these steps aim at development of college.

5.1.18 What special schemes/mechanisms are in place to motivate students for participation in extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural events, etc?

Special schemes and mechanism for the Motivation: The college motivates students to participate in sports and cultural events by giving incentives like financial help, freeships, free hostel accommodation, free diet. Additional classes are arranged for the sports persons as well as the students who participate in cultural activities.

The outstanding students are given incentives in the form of fee concessions. In the session 2015-16 total 495 students got the amount in Rs.**1**,**42**,**83**,**835** in the form of fee concession and scholarships. The policy regarding the grant of incentives is framed by the management after receiving recommendations from the college administration. For the current sessions it is as following:

- In case of Boarders, free hostel and free mess facility for the playing members.
- In case of day Scholars Rs.450/600/900 are paid as diet money to the playing members only during the practice days.

• Inter College Participation/Punjab State Participation or position holders at Distt. Level.

- \succ 50% freeship of the total charges.
- > Free hostel with free mess facilities for the playing members.

> For day scholars Rs. 450/ is paid as diet money to the playing members for the practice period.

• District Level Participation

Only priority in admission with no freeship.

• Co-Curricular Activities: NCC/NSS/Scouts/Girls/Guides/Hiking and Trekking/Divinity etc.

- National/Inter-varsity Position holders: Total freeship (Except Board/ University/DPI(C) charges) but no concession in hostel or mess facility.
- State University level Position holders: Only 50% freeship (Except Board/University/DPI(C) charges) in the total payable college charges. No hostel or mess concession.
- District/Inter-College position holders: Priority in admission and 25% concession in the total payable charges.

Motivation for Sports

Sports Facility: The college has 12 grounds: Athletic track (400 Mts. standard), Badminton, Baseball, Basketball Courts, Boxing ring, Cricket, Football, Handball, Hockey, Kho-Kho, Netball, Volleyball, Swimming pool, a Multipurpose Hall for indoor games namely Badminton, chess, Table Tennis etc.

- > Awarding role of honors to National/International players.
- Awarding scholarships.

• Motivation for Cultural Activities

Department of Youth Welfare and Culture activities provides a platform to the students to groom and present their talent. Following activities are conducted by the department for the motivation of the students.

- Talent search program: In the beginning of each session talent hunt program is conducted on inter departmental basis. Notice for this purpose is displayed on the main notice board and served to different departments and hostels.
- Formation of Cultural Association of students to organize various cultural events.
- Preparation of teams for Inter varsity, state and National level competitions in music, dance, theatre and literary events.
- Motivation of students to participate in youth leadership and training camps organized by the university.
- Promotion of cultural heritage of the college by organizing "Baisakhi" and "Teej" Melas in the college.
- > Organisation of Workshops in theatre, folk dance and music.
- Organisation of Cultural programs in the college where prominent singers and artist are invited.
- Engaging students for participating in the special performances for various community and social causes.
- Providing exposure to the students in films and other professional institutes for future career options.
- For motivation of students for cultural activities the incentives like fee concessions, freeships and scholarships are given.

5.3.3 How often does the college collect feedback from students for improving the support services? How is the feedback used?

Their suggestions serve as an objective tool to introduce need based changes curriculum of various courses.

The student council consists of university and college toppers. The college has department wise societies. The students are elected as President, Secretary and Finance Secretary with senior faculty members as the convenors of the society. The societies can have 50-70 members as volunteers. Rs. 100 is charged as membership fee. 5.3.7 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them. Provide details of their activities.

Following are the academic and administrative bodies have student representations:

- **Toppers Club:** Consists of toppers of all classes (U.G. to P.G.) as its members. They hold meetings with faculty members and the principal and give suggestions for the improvement. They are encouraged to help weak students.
- Hostel Administration: Each wing of girls/boys hostel has a head girl/boy and a prefect who acts as a bridge between the wardens and hostellers to maintain discipline and resolve the problems. In addition they supervise mess and canteen and also organize cultural activities with the help of superintendent. Hostel Gurdwara committee consist of head girl and prefects who manage hostel Gurdwara affairs with the help of superintendent.
- Various Committees: Mess committee, canteen committee, discipline committee are constituted with students as members for smooth running of hostel affairs.
- **Departmental Societies and Clubs** consist of teacher incharges and student as members. Students under the able guidance of their respective teachers actively participate in organising seminar, workshops, competitions etc.
- Library Committee also has students as members.
- NCC and NSS has a large number of students as its members.
- **Students as Members of Discipline Committees** perform their duties during the procession on the eve of Guru Nanak's Birth celebration and other functions organized in the college from time to time.
- Gender Champions Club: Gender Champions Club has been formed for the session 2015-16. Dr. Sawraj Kaur and Dr. Parminder Singh are acting as Nodal teachers for the club. Thirty four members have been selected as representatives of different departments of the college.

- To provide higher education with the focus on transformative education in the context of globalization.
- To provide opportunities for educational, vocational, professional, social, linguistic and cultural development to the people of all abilities and backgrounds so that they can discover their potential and fulfill their aspirations.
- To develop multidimensional personality of the students by providing an opportunity to participate in religious, cultural, co-curricular, theatrical, literary and sports activities.
- To value originality and vision, encourage initiative and promote creativity.
- To instill a sense of pride and achievement of personal accomplishments.
- 6.1.2 Does the mission statement define the college's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, college's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?
- The college aims in designing professional and other job oriented courses which help in easy absorption of the students in the market. Almost all the students pursuing Agricultural, Food Science and Technology, Physiotherapy courses are absorbed in the market. The rate of placement of students of commerce and science streams is also high.
- The college also encourages the students to participate in religious, cultural, co-curricular, literary and sports activities which help them in their multidimensional personality development.

- Lectures, seminars and other activities such as NSS camps, NCC camps, tree plantation drives are organized regularly to acquaint students with social values and their responsibility towards the society.
- Each academic session of the college starts by seeking blessings of Almighty with "Arambhik Ardaas Diwas". The session concludes with "Shukrana Diwas" in the month of April.
- To acquaint students with Indian traditions and values, regular lectures on divinity are organized. They are also made aware of our traditions and values during the tutorials conducted from time to time. Major festivals such as Diwali, Baisakhi and Teean are celebrated. Inter College Diwali Sports tournaments and fairs (melas) are also organized.
- The college runs short term employment oriented certificate and diploma courses which have proved beneficial to the society.
- The college also offers vocational training program for under privileged and poor women of society under its lifelong learning program to train women in cutting, tailoring, food preservation etc.

6.1.3 How is the leadership involved in ensuring the organization's management system development, implementation and continuous improvement?

The leadership is involved in ensuring the formation and functioning of statutory bodies as per UGC guidelines. The decisions taken by statutory bodies are implemented through Deans and Heads of Departments. The implementation of suggestions given in the meetings is reviewed in the subsequent meetings.

• Interaction with stakeholders?

(a) Faculty: The Principal regularly organises staff meetings to apprise them about developments in the college. Feedback from staff members on academic and other issues is also taken.

(b) Students: Organising tutorials is a regular feature of the college. During these tutorials the tutors update students about the policies/decisions and other developments in the college. They are also motivated to share the problems faced by them at department and college level. Apart from this, students meet the HODs, Deans and the Principal as and when required.

(c) **Parents:** Parent teacher meets are organised to update parents about their ward's performance. Their feedback about teaching methods, syllabus and overall academic environment is also sought during these meets.

(d) **Society:** Representatives of the various sections of the society are members of college statutory bodies. Their suggestions and feedback are considered while framing the academic policy of the college.

• Reinforcing culture of excellence?

The college through its Subject Societies encourages the students to organise and manage various academic and non-academic activities. It helps in developing and polishing the managerial skills of students. The college also organizes inter-college competitions in debate, declamation and quiz etc. To motivate the students to excel in academics, the college honours students who score above University toppers in final examination. 63 such students were honoured during the session 2015-16.

To instill culture of excellence students are motivated and encouraged to participate in youth festivals, sports competitions etc. The winners of these events are given incentives by the college.

• Identifying needs and championing organizational development (OD)?

Regular feedback of the students in classes/tutorials and at the time of convocation acts as a tool to identify the needs of the students and also the shortcomings in the college from different perspectives. On identifying such needs the college has taken various steps such as starting up of new employment oriented courses, setting up of better infrastructure, more drinking water points with RO facility, increased capacity of college dispensary, increased sitting capacity of college main library and setting up of new libraries in various departments. All these steps have contributed to the development of the college.

6.1.6 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If yes, indicate the levels of participative management.

- The college management holds a meeting after every two months wherein Principal of the college and two staff representatives participate and give suggestions to the management to enable it to take decisions related to the college.
- Faculty members have been appointed as members of various statutory bodies as per UGC guidelines.

- The college promotes culture of participative management both at the department and college level. The organisational structure of the college is an indicator of a culture of participative management. The Principal regularly holds meetings with faculty, Deans and Heads of Departments to discuss the matters related to college administration and seeks their suggestions to resolve such issues.
- Regular meetings of the departments with proper agenda are convened under the chairmanship of HoDs of respective departments. Suggestions are taken from staff to help the department in providing better facilities to the students.
- The Principal also conducts regular staff meetings wherein the challenges in dealing with certain problems are discussed. Suitable suggestions given by staff are made part of the policy designed to handle such issues.
- At the non teaching level, the Registrar takes care of matters related to administration in consultation with the Principal.

6.1.8 How does the college groom the leadership at various levels?

- (a) **Students:** Departmental subject societies are managed by students of concerned departments. President, Secretary and Finance Secretaries of the societies are elected by the students. The students, under the able guidance of the teachers incharge manage the meetings and events of their departments.
- (b) **Teachers:** Faculty members perform additional duties. Registrar, Deans of Faculties, Deputy Controller of Examination, Directors of various cells,

Conveners and Coordinators of various college committees are from staff members. Most of the teachers are members of administration committees with a convener as its leader. They submit a report of the activities of their respective committee to the authorities.

(c) Administration: The college appoints office bearers to oversee the various functioning of the college. Apart from this, committees have been formed for performing different activities of the college wherein the staff members are appointed as members.

6.1.9 Has the college evolved any strategy for knowledge management? If yes, give details.

Microfilming of 80 newspapers (since 1904), annual reports (1913–2013), college magazine Darbar (since February 1913) and rare books available in the Sikh History and Research Department has been done to preserve them. The college has installed bar coding system in library for easy access of the books. Digitalisation of rare books and manuscripts has been done. In order to update the students towards recent developments and emerging concepts, the college library procured the following during the last four years:

The college has also subscribed to National Knowledge Network (NKN) for enriching the students and faculty members. Reprographic facility has been provided in the library to manage and preserve important material. College also motivates teachers to upload e-lectures on e-governance portal for easy access of the students. This portal acts as one point spot for capturing, developing, sharing and effective use of information.

6.1.10 How are the following values reflected in various functions of the college?

• Contributing to national development

The college contributes to national development by offering wide range of courses catering to the needs of various sections of society. The college has activities under NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club through which outreach programs are undertaken in community. College gives coaching to Civil Services and other competitive exams aspirants. Many of college alumni are serving at top positions of various sectors and hence contributing to the national development. College also has the honour of producing Olympians, International, National and State level sports persons.

• Fostering global competencies among students

Being an Autonomous College, many changes in the curriculum have been made by most of the faculties keeping in mind the International demands. The college aims at including practical training in as many courses as possible which will help in developing skills of the students. The college also arranges personality development, IELTS and Spoken English classes for fostering global competences amongst students.

• Inculcating a value system among students

To inculcate a value system amongst students, extension lectures and seminars are organized in the college. Faculty from Sikh History and Research Centre visit different classes on regular basis and inculcate moral values by delivering lectures on divinity. College also organises seminars cum interaction sessions of staff and students on certain issues such as AIDS, Drug De-addiction, Women Health Environment where experts from respective areas are invited. The departments organize inter and intra college competitions to promote team spirit and tolerance among students. The college also organizes orientation programs and motivational lectures to inculcate value system among students.

• Promoting use of technology

The college has set up fully equipped smart class rooms in the department of Chemistry, Physics, Agriculture and Commerce. Computer labs with required number of systems have also been setup in various departments. Students are encouraged to use technology for seminars and presentations for which projectors have been provided to all departments. All the departments are equipped with internet connectivity for use by the students and faculty members. College has established UGC-CPE funded centralized fully equipped computer lab for the use of students.

• Quest for excellence

The college has formed 21 societies which are managed by students of respective department. Arranging various activities under the banner of these committees develop managerial skills among students. The college also has Career Guidance Cell for guiding the students for preparation of competitive exams such as civil services and NET where students from within the college as well as other colleges are allowed to take admission. These services are provided to students at highly subsidised rates. College has two research journals with ISSN numbers published bi-annually.

6.1.11 Give details of the UGC autonomous review committee's recommendations and its compliance.

The college was conferred Autonomous status in July 2013. The visit of review committee is due in 2017.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the college have a Perspective Plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered in development of policy and strategy.

The college has prepared comprehensive plan for overall development. The key aspects considered are as follows:

• Teaching and learning

The college encourages its teachers to participate in Faculty Development Programmes, for which, duty leave is granted to them. To enrich and upgrade the knowledge of teachers, college has subscribed to various research journals and periodicals, which are available in the main and departmental libraries. The college library procured 8895 text and reference books costing Rs. 32,45,799/during the last four years. To update the students with recent developments, all the departments have made suitable changes in the curriculum. Inclusion of training and seminars in courses provide technical edge to the students. College has introduced inter disciplinary subjects in M.Phil., B.A. (Social Science), Master in Performing Arts, B.A. (Hons.) in English and Punjabi with an aim to develop intellectually stimulating learning environment.

• Research and development

In an effort to foster serious research in college, M.Phil. program in Commerce, English, Punjabi and Political Science has been introduced. Through its Research Committee the college motivates the teachers to apply for research projects. Free internet access, printout and photostat facility have been provided to teachers within their departments. Due to these efforts 3 major and 9 minor research projects have been completed during last four years. 4 major research projects are still in progress. During the session 2016-17, 4 minor research projects of Rs. 13,34,350/- were sanctioned by UGC. College plans to establish faculty wise research centres in future.

The college also took the initiative to publish research journals. Two research journals (Punjabi and Science) are being published and three research journals (Agriculture, Commerce and Social Sciences) are in pipeline. Both the published journals have been indexed by National Science Library.

• Community engagement

OPD in Physiotherapy department, Farmer Training Centre, Bone Testing Camp, Blood Group Testing Camp, Blood Donation Camp, Polio Eradication Awareness Rally, Life Long Learning Centre etc. are part of college policy of community engagement. The college also organises Voter Awareness Rally to sensitize the community toward their voting rights. Every year the college NSS units organizes seven day camp wherein the students visit nearby villages and provide community service.

Human resource planning and development

The requirement of the faculty of various departments is requisitioned before the start of the session. The posts are advertised and filled by conducting interviews. The appointment of any person on the job is done on the basis of eligibility criteria notified by UGC/DPI/Government/University. Faculty members are motivated to attend refresher courses, general orientation courses, workshops, faculty development programs, seminars etc. The college provides duty leave to faculty members for attending the same.

• Industry interaction


The college has an Industry Linkage Cell. Leading industrialists are invited in college to know their expectations and requirements from educational institutions. Persons from industry are also members of Board of Studies of different departments. Their suggestions are considered while designing the curriculum. Inclusion of training and submission of project report as per industrial requirements has been made in suitable existing programmes.

• Internationalisation

The college has signed an MoU with 'Sarbat Da Bhala Trust' based in New Delhi. The trust has undertaken to sponsor 75% of the fees of 50 students who pursue Diploma in Gatka. The trust has paid Rs. 11,25,000 during the session 2016-17. Another MoU with Punjab Agriculture University regarding production of seeds in college has also been signed. To promote and develop Cricket in the college, an MoU was signed with Punjab Cricket Association.

6.2.2 Enunciate the internal organizational structure of the college for decision making processes and their effectiveness.

The college has developed organisational structure keeping participative management in consideration.



The Dean, HoDs and Incharge of various committees are responsible for completion of work assigned to them. The effectiveness of the work done is ensured in meetings of BoS and Academic Council.

6.2.3 Specify how many planned proposals were initiated/implemented during the last four years. Give details.

During the last four years, the college not only planned but successfully executed many proposals. Here under is the detail of various projects initiated by the college:

• New Courses: Apart from offering core subjects in various faculties, research degree programs in Commerce, English, Punjabi and Political Science have been commenced in 2015. Certain courses with better prospects of employability such as Bachelor of Journalism and Mass Communication, B.Sc. in Fashion Designing and M.Sc. (Pharmaceutical Chemistry) have also been introduced. A number of new PG and UG Diplomas have also been started by the college.

6.2.4 Does the college have a formally stated quality policy? How is it designed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The college has designed its quality policy. College has established IQAC for regular review of the quality standards of teaching in college.

• Designing of Quality Policy

Quality policy is designed in meetings of all Heads, Deans and other Administrators under the chairmanship of Principal and is duly approved by statutory bodies.

• Deployment of Policy

It is deployed through the concerned HoD's who convey the policy to staff members in departmental meetings.

• Review of Policy

The policy is reviewed in regular meetings of statutory bodies.

6.2.5 How does the college ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder-relationship?

The college handles the grievances of the students and staff on priority bases in different ways:

• At Student Level

The grievances of the students as reported to class incharge, HoD, Deans, Principal or in tutorial groups are analyzed by a committee constituted by the Principal. The issues at college level are resolved under the guidance of the Principal and at departmental level by the concerned Head/Dean. Informal feedback from students is also taken by the Principal from time to time.

• At Staff Level

To address grievances of staff the college has formed Grievance Appeal Committee. To resolve any such issue related to students, college has appointed Dean Students Welfare for both boys and girls. Any complaint received from staff or/and student is immediately referred to the concerned committee. The redressal is done at the earliest.

6.2.6 Does the college have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

The college takes feedback from students at various levels. A committee of senior faculty members analyzes student feedback on institutional performance. The committee discusses the suggestions of students with the Principal. The administration responds and necessary steps are taken to start new courses, building new class rooms, separate cafeteria, new hostels, clean roads, clean water by adding RO system at different locations and upgradation of labs on the suggestions of students.

6.2.7 In what way the affiliating University helped the college to identify the developmental needs of the college?

Nominees from affiliating university are members of various BOSs, Academic Council and Governing Body. They give their suggestions on developmental, curriculum and other latest issues which are duly incorporated in the policy of the college.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university have a functional College Development Council (CDC) or Board of College and University Development (BCUD)? If yes, In what way college is benefitted.

The affiliating university has a functional College Development Council. The Principal of college is member of CDC. He discusses problems of college in CDC meetings and tries to get these resolved from university administration.

6.2.9 How does the college get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how it is utilized?

- Regular meetings of teaching and non-teaching staff are conducted by the Principal and HoDs wherein feedback on the working of the college is taken.
- Every year alumni meet is organized to take feedback and suggestions of Alumni.
- Parent teacher meets are organized during the session, where the parents are provided feedback on their ward's performance. Their feedback on college working is also taken.
- The relevant feedback is discussed by the Principal with the management as well as with the office bearers, Heads/Deans to take remedial measures.

6.2.10 Does the college encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

- College has given full autonomy to its departments to make suitable changes in syllabi considering present needs of the society. Introduction of new programs are also proposed by the departments through its BOS for consideration for approval by Academic Council.
- The college has given freedom to the heads to manage their respective departments. They have been given free hand in adding to and improving the infrastructure of their departments. The appointment of adhoc staff is done on the recommendation of the heads of respective department.
- At the end of each session, college gets the Self Appraisal Performa filled from every department and faculty members. This information is analysed by a committee of senior faculty members dully constituted by Principal. Academic Audit Committee conducts the audit of departments on the basis of information provided by HoDs.
- Academic Council and Governing Body review the performance of departments and resolve any issues related to departmental workings.

6.2.11 Does the college conduct performance auditing of its various departments?

The college has formed Internal Audit Committee which conducts performance audit of all the departments. Self Appraisal Performas (as per guidelines of NAAC) are used to assess the performance of the departments.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the college to enhance the professional development of teaching and non teaching staff?

• Regular seminars, guest lectures, workshops and conferences are organized by college to upgrade the knowledge of teaching staff. College grants duty leave to its faculty members to attend Refresher, General Orientation Courses, workshops, seminars, Faculty Development Programs etc. organized by UGC-Human Resource Development Centre.

- Workshop on computer learning, e-governance and other related areas is organised by the college to appraise non-teaching staff on computer related technicalities.
- 6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions.

Major outcomes of review of Performance Appraisal Reports during the last four years are as following:

- Three major and nine minor research projects have been completed, 8 major and minor research projects are in progress.
- Significant increase in number of research publications of the staff members has been witnessed.
- The faculty members upload their lectures and reading material in .doc, .pdf or .ppt format on e-governance portal.
- Many teachers have attended refresher courses, general orientation courses, workshops, seminars and conferences.

Major decisions taken by college to motivate faculty members towards research are as follows:

- To encourage research publications, college started publication of two research journals (with ISSN numbers) for which faculty members are motivated to submit their research papers. The research papers are published after adopting standard review procedure.
- The details regarding achievements of the faculty members along with their photographs are printed in the news bulletin.
- College has a policy of granting duty leave to faculty members who wish to attend Refresher/General Orientation Courses, Workshops, Seminars or Conferences etc. Their achievements are appreciated by the college though News Bulletin.

6.3.3 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

• The college has set up dispensary in the campus where a full time doctor and nursing staff is available. During the last 4 years, following percentage of staff availed services of dispensary:

- The college promotes organic farming for which 3 acre farm land has been allotted for producing organic vegetables. The college is also maintaining nursery for plants. Most of the faculty members buy vegetables and plants from college farm and nursery at concessional rates.
- Mutual aid fund for providing financial help to the staff members in case of any emergency is also being maintained by the staff club.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the college for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

• The college prefers to appoint experienced qualified staff. Priority is given to those candidates who have earned Doctoral degrees. College also promotes its present employees to pursue Doctoral degree. The number of Ph.D staff members has increased in the recent past.

Findings:

- (i) There is significant increase in the number of girls students over a period of four years.
- (ii) The number of girl students is more in PG courses as compared to UG courses.
- (iii) There is a significant increase in the number of girl students seeking admission and admitted in Agriculture and Food Science courses.

6.3.6 Does the college conduct any gender sensitization programs for its staff?

The college has constituted Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) as per UGC notification for prevention, prohibition and redressal of sexual harassment of women employee and student in higher education. This committee organizes seminars and lectures for sensitizing the staff towards these issues.

6.3.7 What is the impact of the University's UGC-Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing competencies of the College faculty?

The faculty members acquire and improve basic skills of teaching by attending Refresher and General Orientation Courses, Workshops, Winter and Summer Schools organised by UGC-Human Resource Development Centre. They keep themselves abreast of the latest developments in their specific fields and use these techniques and information in enriching college students.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

As per the Autonomous College guidelines, college has established Finance Committee comprising of Principal, Bursar and Finance Secretary of the college management. All the decisions regarding application of funds are taken by this committee after considering the needs of college with regards to academic and non-academic activities.

6.4.2 Does the college have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

- College has internal check mechanism for internal audit. The departmental needs are verified from the Registrar, DAA and OSD before presenting to the Principal. The complete inventory record is maintained on e-governance to assist the authorities for further verification of inventory with the departments. The financial data relating to college is checked by the Bursar and the Accounts Officer.
- External audit is conducted by a Chartered Accountant firm M/s Sehgal, Khanna, Mundra, Mehra and Co.



- 6.4.4 Have the accounts been audited regularly? What are the major audit objections and how are they complied with?
- The accounts of college are audited regularly by the Chartered Accountants from M/s Sehgal, Khanna, Mundra, Mehra & Co.
- No major objections have been raised by the auditors. Any minor objection, if raised, is resolved immediately after making compliance of objections.

6.4.5 Narrate the efforts taken by the college for resource mobilization.

- Most of the funds required for resource mobilization are raised through fees charged from the students.
- The college also mobilizes funds by acquiring grants from State Government, Central Government (DST, DBT, UGC) and MPLAD funds.
- The college has also raised 63 sponsored scholarships for the benefit of financially weaker brilliant students.

6.4.6 Is there any provision for the college to maintain the 'corpus fund'? If yes, give details.

The college has maintained 'corpus fund' of Rs. 6,18,013 in the form of FDRs hypothecated with affiliating university.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Does the College conduct an academic audit of its departments? If yes, give details.

- There is an Academic Audit Committee of the college consisting of senior faculty members.
- The college conducts the Academic Audit every year. The Self Appraisal Performas (as per NAAC guidelines) are distributed in the departments and to individual teachers. Academic Audit Committee visits each department to verify the facts mentioned in the SAP. On the basis of Self Appraisal Performas and observations, the committee recommends the necessary steps to improve the academic standards.

6.5.2 Based on the recommendations of academic audit what specific measures have been taken by the college to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

- On the basis of the recommendations of academic audit the following provisions have been incorporated in the academic policy of the college:
 - Remedial Classes
 - > Tutorial groups
 - Counselling to students at the beginning of the session.
 - Internal assessment on the basis of class tests, house examinations and student seminars.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the college to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

• The college has well established IQAC for continuous review of teaching learning process. Structure of IQAC is as per UGC guidelines. The Principal

of the college is the chairman and a senior teacher is appointed as co-ordinator of the cell. In addition to five senior most members of the faculty, the IQAC has its members from various sections of the society.

- IQAC meets regularly to review the academic standards and quality measures established by the college.
- Suggestions from members are recorded and the administration takes suitable measures to implement them.

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

- The recommendations of IQAC led to starting of remedial classes, tutorial groups, counselling session of students in the college. All these efforts further led to higher academic standards.
- Due to regular analysis of teachers performance and motivation infused in them for excelling further, significant increase in the number of faculty members with doctoral degree has been witnessed. Increase in number of research publications has also been observed in the past few years. The recommendation of IQAC led to publishing of research journals in college.
- IQAC also recommended rebuilding of infrastructure for providing better facilities to students. Considering these recommendations, many new buildings have been constructed and old buildings have been renovated and repaired.

6.5.5 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

- IQAC has three members representing various sections of society.
- They have contributed significantly towards improvement of academic standards of the college. Following suggestions of the members were included in the academic policy of college:
 - > To use modern methods of teaching and setting up of smart classrooms.
 - > To incorporate mock interviews and group discussion in the syllabus.
 - > To start tutorial groups for hearing the problems of students.
 - > To hold interactive sessions and discussions with the students.
 - > To emphasize on enriching students in current affairs, quantitative aptitude, personality development and communication skills.
 - To invite more companies for providing placement opportunities to students.
 - > To set up solar geysers and lights in the hostels.
 - > To set up extension counter of bank and ATM in college premises.

6.5.6 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

IQAC every year conducts a study on incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged section of society. The findings of the study for the last four years have been given in the table hereunder:

6.5.7 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centres, etc.?

- All the academic matters are discussed in BOS of respective departments.
- Academic council meets twice in a year to review academic and administrative performance of college.
- Feedback from students is taken at the end of academic session where students evaluate performance of teachers.
- At the end of each academic session, teachers are required to submit self appraisal form where they provide information related to their performance in academic, research and co-curricular activities.
- Research committee has been constituted by the college. This committee recommended setting up of research centres in the college. Research centre has been set up for science on the recommendation of the committee. Infrastructure is being built for Commerce Research Centre and Agricultural Research Centre.

CRITERIA VII INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the college conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

The college is located in an area of 300 acres with green vegetations and vast lush green playground and fields. To keep the campus clean and green, the college has developed internal audit system. Various measures taken by the college are:

- Planting of trees and plants
- Creation/expansion of grounds
- Infrastructure development without disturbing the green cover
- Rain water harvesting
- Energy conservation by use of solar energy
- Recycling/Management of waste

Although the college does not conduct green audit of its campus it actively involves itself in spreading awareness and knowledge among students and staff members to make them environment friendly.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

- **Energy conservation**: As the main building of the college is more than 100 years old architectural marvel, its thick walls (18-24 inches) with high ceilings (20 to 24 feet) make the classrooms airy and well lit. Therefore, more energy consuming electrical gadgets like air conditioners are not required.
 - > CFL and LED bulbs have been installed in place of incandescent bulbs.
 - The students and staff members ensure switching off all electrical fittings before leaving their classrooms or labs.
- Use of renewable energy: Twenty solar lights have been installed in the campus for providing green energy and saving energy. One solar water heater has been installed in the boys hostel and the process of installation of three more solar water heaters in the student hostels are in the pipeline.
- Water harvesting:
 - Eleven new rain water harvesting bores have been installed in the campus for ground water recharge. The new buildings which are constructed have rain water harvesting systems for recharging the sub-soil water.
 - All rain water from buildings of the college flows to lawns and grounds, thus, irrigating them and recharging sub surface water level.
- Check dam construction: No check dams are constructed as area is non flood prone.

- Efforts for carbon neutrality:
 - The college has large green cover for carbon neutrality and keeps on increasing this cover by regular plantation drives in and around the campus.
 - e-governance has reduced the paper usage considerably helping in carbon neutrality.

• Plantation:

- Van-mahotsava is observed every year and new trees are planted in the college campus by NSS/NCC students, teachers and management members.
- Students are sensitized through street plays (Nukad Natak) on environment conservation and are encouraged to participate in plantation drives.

• Hazardous waste management:

- Separate (coloured) dustbins have been installed at different places for biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste management. The waste is collected by municipal van every day for its proper disposal.
- > Practice of dumping damaged glassware and wastes in specified locations.
- Bio medical waste is disposed by a liaison agency "Amritsar Bio-medical Waste Disposal" under annual contract with them since 2011.

• E-waste management:

A government registered company "Attero Recyclying" has been engaged and 3865 kg of e-waste was disposed off in an environment friendly manner.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

• Effective Administration:

➤ Use of IT in Administration or E-Governance: Introduction of e-governance by the college has facilitated exchange of information and communication between management, faculty and students thereby improving administration/governance of the college. Centralized e-governance office has been established in the administrative block of the college with two full time employees for uploading of information. One e-governance cell has been established in every department of the college and one teacher incharge i.e., Eighteen teacher incharges for e-governance have been appointed for departmental information uploading. Information regarding inventory of all the departments like number of students, number of faculty members (department wise), annual budget (department wise), future expansion plans, all official as well as unofficial letters, salary statements, leave record and date of next annual increment of the employee etc. is available. The students can get information regarding their lecture statements, fee receipts, e-lectures, award lists, information

about holidays online. The management of the college has administrative password for downloading information from this website and on the basis of the information available on this website suitable policy is framed from time to time to manage the affairs of the college.

- Single Window Admission System: To make the admission process simplified and time saving new administrative block has been constructed having all the offices such as Dean Academic Affairs, Registrar, Accounts, Bank Extension Counter for fee collection and e-governance are brought at the same place.
- Admission Counselling Committee: The college has admission counselling committee which provides all the information regarding courses, fee structure and also addresses other queries of the students. This committee also provides information to SC/ST and minority students regarding special incentives for them. This has significantly benefited the students in making right choice regarding courses and has also increased their strength.
- Contact Accessibility: College has published one college directory and one alumni directory so as to provide contact information to staff and alumni for their accessibility to all the stakeholders.
- Effective Teaching:
 - Smart Classrooms: Seven new smart classrooms with multimedia projectors are working in the college. Students also participate in inter and intra department power point presentation competitions. Moreover these classrooms also help the students to grasp the concepts in a better way.
 - Audio Visual Labs: To improve the language skills of students the college has fully equipped audio visual language lab which has helped students to learn the finer aspects of language such as right pronunciations, usage of appropriate words etc.
 - Workshops/Seminars for Students: Workshops on communication skills and personality development are organised by engaging faculty and resource persons from various institutions and industries. This is beneficial for the overall grooming of students as job placements depend on communication skills of the individual.
 - Promoting Research Acumen Among Students: In the last 5 years, 138 seminars were organized by different departments and the students were involved in them. Two new research journals (in the field of sciences and languages) were started and their third issues have been published. Students are subscribers of these journals and they are also encouraged to contribute research papers for these journals. Three new journals (in the field of agricultural sciences, commerce and social sciences) are in the pipeline and M.Phil. and master degree students have already submitted research papers for these forth coming journals.
 - M.Phil. degree courses have been introduced in four streams i.e., Punjabi, English, Political Science and Commerce to promote research.

- Research/Project work in master degree program of all science streams has been made compulsory and students are required to submit elaborate report of the research done.
- After 2013, for new appointment of faculty members preference is being given to Ph.D. candidates keeping in mind the future expansion plans.
- Remedial Classes for Academically Weak Students: Academically weak students are identified on the basis of house test results and the bottom 20 per cent students are provided extra classes to help students to improve their performance in final examination.
- Tutorial Groups: To get feedback of students regarding their problems in teaching and learning, infrastructural requirements or other general problems, tutorial groups are formed by combining students from interdisciplinary streams or sometimes from the same stream. Presently more than 116 tutorial groups involving 232 teacher incharges are formed. Students interact with the tutors and provide useful feedback regarding department and college level deficiencies. The feedback report covering academic and non academic issues separately is sent to the concerned department for analysis and implementation.
- Heritage Conservation: The college building restoration work is regularly being carried out so as to conserve the heritage structure. In order to conserve rare manuscripts and Sikh artefacts, the college has one museum in the old block. The digitization work of the department to preserve records for future generations was done recently. The construction of a new block for heritage museum is ongoing near Gurudwara Sahib.
- School Visits: To create awareness among rural people about course curriculum, scholarships offered, facilities and socio cultural environment of the college, school visits were organized by the college and various teams of faculty members visited senior secondary schools of district Amritsar. The information regarding courses offered by the college was provided to all the senior secondary schools of Amritsar and neighboring districts through career guidance manual published by the college. The copies of this manual were circulated to all the school libraries, principals, teachers and students free of cost.
- Farmer Centric Approach:
 - Keeping in mind the distressed situation of the farmers at national level in general and Punjab State in particular, a farmer centric program i.e. Agents of Change was started by Khalsa College Amritsar in collaboration with Columbian Water Centre, USA. Faculty members and students of agriculture department visited 65 villages of Amritsar and Tarn Taran district to gather information regarding socio economic problems of farmers of this region. The probable solution to these problems are discussed with experts of the concerned field and farmers are informed about them. The program is presently ongoing and is in its next phase.

- ➤ Soil testing lab has been established to provide soil testing facility at nominal charges to the farmers of this border area so as to reduce the over consumption of fertilizers in this area.
- Organic product outlet: To make the campus environment friendly the college practices organic farming and has set up an outlet for the sale of organic products.
- A memorandum of understanding with Punjab Agriculture University Ludhiana was signed to provide quality hybrid fodder seeds to dairy farmers of this region through Khalsa College Amritsar.
- Vocational Training Centre: The centre under lifelong learning program offers free three months certificate courses to provide training in cutting, tailoring, embroidery, food processing and preservation to economically weak women from nearby areas for their self employment. Free education to under privileged childrens is provided by NSS volunteers of the college in this centre.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

7.3.1 Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the college.

The college observes number of practices like

 - Farmer training centre

- (iii) Staff Club: Staff club was established with the sole objective of addressing the problems of staff and organizing staff meetings and functions. The faculty members are also provided with financial assistance in case of medical emergency and untimely death.
- (iv) Subject Societies in the Departments: The societies are managed by the students under the supervision of teacher incharge. The students are encouraged to participate in these seminars not only in the college but also in other colleges/universities.
- (v) Inculcating Religious and Moral Values Amongst Youth
 - By Nagar Kirtan (Religious procession)

- Kirtan Darbars
- Arambhic Aradas (Session beginning prayer)
- Shukrana Aradas (Session ending prayer)
- Divinity Classes
- (vi) Student Social Activities: Units of NSS, Red Ribbon Club are functioning in the College and they involve students in the activities like
 - Field work and village visits.
 - Organizing camps like AIDS awareness, Drug menace, Female foeticide etc.
 - Blood donation and blood testing camps.
 - Frequent visits to old age homes, homes for physically/mentally challenged people.
 - Tree plantation drives.
 - Cleanliness drives.
 - Student theatre groups.
 - Classes of children of labourers.

However, the two best practices which have contributed significantly in improvement of academic as well as administrative functioning of the College are:

- Institutional Social Responsibility
- Use of IT in Administration or e-governance

BEST PRACTICE – I

1. Title of the Practice:

Institutional Social Responsibility

2. Objectives of the Practice:

The objectives of this practice are in accordance with the mission of our institution i.e. to imbibe students with moral values taught by the Gurus for the benefit of the community and the country. The emphasis is on development of moral values, to sensitize and involve the students in their social responsibility of serving the society. The college is committed to address the needs of vulnerable sections of the society like SC/ST's, minorities and rural population. The problems like gender inequality/discrimination, drug abuse etc. also need the attention of educational institutions. Therefore, Khalsa College Amritsar, being a pioneer educational institution of this rural area, has accepted its responsibility for social well being in consonance with the policies of the nation.

3. The Context:

The issues are multidimensional as these involve heterogeneous population having multiple problems of different magnitudes. Therefore, keeping in view the availability of resources alongwith physical, academic and administrative infrastructure, the specific issues of wider concern are focussed.

4. The Practice:

The college fulfils its social responsibility in the following manner:

(i) Farmer Training Centre: The college caters to the large rural area and major occupation of people is agriculture. A farmer training centre has been functioning in the college since 1969 to provide latest information by experts to supplement income of the farmers of the area through farmer trainings, field demonstrations and expert extension lectures in the field of agriculture to the farmers. The centre organises more than 100 block level and district level camps annually in collaboration with state agriculture department (Table 7.1). It also imparts training in bee keeping, mushroom cultivation, pest control, food and vegetable processing. The centre is also actively working to improve the socio economic status of women in farming business by organizing training camps on food processing techniques like pickle, jam, jellies, squash, sauces making etc. especially for them. It is pertinent to mention here that in the last 5 years, 183 camps have been organized for women and more than 6000 womens participants have attended and benefited from these camps. (Table 7.1).

(ii) **OPD and Treatment in Physiotherapy Department**: The college runs outpatient facility along with treatment using latest machinery in physiotherapy department for everyone at nominal charges of Rs. 10/- per visit as compared to Rs. 200 to 300 per visit charged by private physiotherapy

centres of this area (Table 7.2). Moreover, the department also organizes free medical camps where free medical checkups, physiotherapy treatment, homeopathic treatments and free medicines are provided to poor patients (Table 7.2).

- (iii) Vocational Training Centre: The centre under lifelong learning program offers free three months certificate courses to provide training in cutting, tailoring, embroidery, food processing and preservation to economically weak women from nearby areas. Free education to under privileged childrens is provided by NSS volunteers of the college in this centre.
- (iv) Scholarships for Needy Students: The college provides 63 scholarships to meritorious and needy students as per the guidelines for the scholarships. Fee concessions to economically poor students for their education are also provided.

- (v) Free Career Guidance Information: The college organizes free career guidance seminar for Principals and students of all the schools of this region. Free career guidance books are provided to all the schools of Amritsar and nearby districts so as to guide students regarding career options in their field of choice. The career guidance is also provided to our own students through a cell working under the guidance of Director Career Guidance who happens to be a senior faculty member of the college.
- (vi) Awareness Campaigns: The college organizes one seminar and a poster making competition every year in collaboration with Red Ribbon Club, so as to generate awareness in youth against social evils like drug abuse, AIDS etc. Moreover, the theatre group of the college organises plays, street plays on social issues such as drug addiction, women victimization, female foeticide, terrorism, cultural crisis and environment issues etc. within and outside the campus regularly.
- (vii) Gender equality: In the society where adverse sex ratio due to female foeticide and poor literacy among females persist, the college fulfils its responsibility in promoting gender equality. The college provides equal

educational opportunity to women and has created Cell for Grievance Redressal and Dean Student Welfare (girls) is a senior member who takes care of the problems of girl students. This has resulted in a considerable increase in the strength of girl students and more than 50% of the total students admitted are girls. (Table 7.4).

- Environment Friendly Approach: The degradation of environment due to human interference is an issue of wider concern as it effects human and animal health. Therefore, conservation of environment for reducing the level of pollution, increasing vegetative cover, providing clean and green environment for everyone is a challenge in the present world. For these objectives, the college has adopted eco-friendly approach to reduce air and water pollution by sensitizing the students, staff members and society for environmental conservation for its sustainability. The environmental friendly approach involves many practices such as:
 - Organic Farming: Organic farming is undertaken on 65 acres of college farm to discourage use of agrochemicals (insecticides, pesticides and weedicides), improve soil health, reduce water pollution and conserve the ecosystem. One Bio-pest control lab has been established for multiplication of friendly insects for control of pests. Experts from agriculture faculty and from organic field supervise farming from time to time. Outlet for organic products have been opened at college gate where organically produced fruits, vegetables and cereals are sold so as to popularize organic food among masses.
 - Plantation and Maintenance of Plants: Van-mahotsava is observed every year and new trees are planted in the College campus by NSS/NCC students, teachers, management members. Students are sensitized and encouraged to be part of plantation drives. The college has its own landscaping management committee and a man force of forty (40) workers especially for maintenance of plants.
 - Nursery: The college has its own nursery where ornamental, fruit, flower plants are available at nominal charges. It caters to the demand of rural as well as urban people by providing them qualitative plant material.
 - Use of Renewable Sources of Energy: Twenty solar lights have been installed in the campus for providing green energy and saving energy. One

solar water heater has been installed in the boys hostel and the process of installation of three more solar water heaters in the student hostels are in the pipeline.

- Ground Water Recharge: All the newly constructed buildings have rain water harvesting bore to recharge the sub-soil water. Moreover eleven new rain water harvesting bores have been installed for ground water recharge. All rain water flows from the buildings of the college to lawns and grounds, thus, irrigating them and recharging sub surface water level.
- Energy Conservation: The main building of the college has thick walls (18-24 inches) with high ceilings (20 to 24 feet) making classrooms airy and well lit, therefore, more energy consuming electrical gadgets like air conditioners are not required. Also, CFL and LED bulbs have been installed in place of incandescent bulbs. The students and staff members ensure switching off all electrical fittings before leaving their classrooms or labs.
- Reduction in CO₂ Emission: Zero tolerance policy against crop residue/garbage burning in the college campus and on agricultural farm is enforced. Ban on entry of four wheelers of students in the college campus to reduce vehicular pollution within the campus. Moreover, e-governance has reduced paper usage considerably in the campus thereby reducing CO₂ emission.

Efficient Waste Management

- a) The college has installed separate coloured dustbins at different places for biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste management. The waste is collected by municipal van every day for its proper disposal.
- b) Two large septic tanks have been installed for recycling of animal waste (urine and dung) and organic waste to generate compost (organic manure) to be used on agricultural farm.
- c) The college follows the practice of dumping damaged glassware and wastes at specified locations.
- d) Bio medical waste is disposed by a liaison agency "Amritsar Biomedical Waste Disposal" under annual contract with them since the year 2011.
- e-waste management: A government registered company "Attero Recyclying" has been engaged and 3865 kg of e-waste was disposed off in environment friendly manner.

5. Evidence of Success:

• There is great demand for skill development courses run by Centre for Lifelong Learning which highlights the popularity of these programs. Most of the pass outs are self employed and successfully running their own business. As majority of them are women therefore, it has helped in gender upliftment through financial independence.

- The increase in number of patients every year in physiotherapy OPD highlights the success of this program.
- The increased demand for farmer trainings and camps by villages of Amritsar and adjoining districts is an evidence of the success of Farmer Training Centre.
- Increase in number of SC/ST students and girl students in the college.
- Increase in the green cover and clean environment of the college.
- The reduction in paper usage due to e governance has made environment more clean.
- The increase in number of people from the vicinity for morning and evening walks in the campus highlight lower pollution level in the college.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- More spacious building for Centre for Life Long Learning is required to accommodate large number of people who may apply for skill development programs run by the Centre.
- Majority of the children who are given free education are of labourers and as they are migratory in nature, thereby making the teacher's job difficult.
- The college dispensary and the department of physiotherapy find it difficult to fulfil all the health care needs of a large number of patients visiting the dispensary.
- The farmer training centre has limited space and resources to meet the aspirations of the farming community of this region.
- The following resources are required for fulfilling institutional social responsibility:
 - Larger Farmer Training Centre with research and development facility, more manpower and increased annual budget.
 - Multi specialty hospital with inpatient facilities for at least 100 patients. Latest medical equipment and machinery for specialised treatments for under privileged sections of the society.
 - The students from SC/ST and economically weaker section of society sometime get involved in self earning practices due to financial compulsions which increases their dropout rate. The college is ready to provide free education to these students but providing financial stability to them is beyond the college domain.
 - As the college is located on the main G.T. road therefore, pollution due to heavy traffic becomes a big challenge. The college has undertaken construction work on a large scale in the last three years which has also disturbed the clean environment of the campus.

BEST PRACTICE – II

1. Title of the Practice

Use of Information Technology for Administration or e-governance.

2. Objectives of the Practice

- To improve management/governance by helping exchange of information and communication transaction between management, faculty and students i.e. better coordination.
- To make administrative work systematic, quick and transparent by exchange of information among all stake holders.
- To provide information regarding inventory of all the departments and labs, number of students, number of faculty members (department wise), annual budget (department wise) and other relevant information for effective management and planning.
- To help in effective communication transaction from departments to the administrative wing and vice versa as all official as well as unofficial letters and information is exchanged via e-governance.
- To provide information regarding salary statements, leave record and provident fund of the employee.
- To provide information to students regarding their lecture statements, award lists, information about holidays, online lectures for them and results.

3. Context

The challenging issue for implementation of e-governance in this big institution was to make available large information from widely spread departments at one place and maintain a communication network which can provide effective governance.

4. Practice

- A centralized e-governance office has been established in the administrative block of the college with two full time employees for uploading of information.
- An e-governance cell has been established in every department of the college with a teacher incharge of e-governance and facilities like one computer system along with Wi-Fi internet facility. Eighteen teacher incharges for e-governance have been appointed for uploading departmental information. The uploads regarding inventory of the department, student strength, budget, future expansion plans e-lectures for students are done regularly.
- In the initial years, the teaching and non teaching staff members were trained for administration and usage of e-governance for administrative services. In the succeeding years, more services were included specially regarding teaching and learning and the students were also provided access to e-governance.
- All the employees have been provided with one e-governance account for sharing information from their department via e-governance with the administration or students.

- The students have been provided e-governance user ID for downloading information regarding e-lectures, fee slips, lecture statements and award lists.
- The management of the college has administrative password for downloading information from this website and on the basis of the information available on this website suitable policy is framed from time to time to manage the affairs of the college.

5. Evidence of Success:

- The e-governance has become a useful tool for staff (salary statements, leave record, provident fund and notices), students (lecture statements, award lists, information about holidays, online lectures and results), principal and management for their diverse needs.
- The paper usage for the academic and administrative work in the campus has decreased significantly and evidence of success corroborated with constant upgradation of more services to the stake holders through e-governance.
- The admission process has expedited resulting in increase of college strength.
- Examination system has become more time efficient, effective and economical as all results are available online.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Training of staff members: As all the members of non teaching were not computer literate/technology savvy, it required extra effort in the form of trainings by experts.
- Handling of data: As this service involves huge data uploading/ requirement/management more manpower and man-hours are required for handling of data.
- The students from rural areas could not access their e-governance accounts due to lack of internet accessibility at their end.
- The following resources are required for e-governance:
 - > One server
 - Department wise access points with computer systems and internet facility
 - > Manpower

29. Was any need assessment exercise undertaken before the development of new programs?

If so, give the methodology:

• The proposal to add new post graduate streams in Soil Science, Veg. Science and Entomology was considered in the department staff meetings. The need was put up in the proceedings. Then the proposal was put up in Board of Studies meeting where it was discussed, studied and put up for approval in the next Board of Studies. The proposal was unanimously passed by the members. Ultimately the decision was approved and passed by the Academic Council. The following streams were passed to be started in the following years.

2015-16 - M.Sc. in Soil Science and Vegetable Science

2016-17 - M.Sc. in Entomology

Similarly, regarding the syllabi and curriculum, members of Board of Studies 2016 suggested changes as per latest recommendations of I.C.A.R. The feasibility and viability of the proposal was looked into, studied and discussed. Keeping in view the available infrastructure and teachers, the proposal was then put up for discussion in Academic Council which approved and passed to implement 5th Dean Committee report of I.C.A.R from 2016-17.

Six diplomas and 3 certificate courses were considered in Board of Studies and passed in Academic Council-2016 to cater to the demand of those who want to pursue the field on commercial lines. Out of six approved diplomas, two (diploma in landscaping and seed technology) have been formally introduced and classes started for the session 2016-17.

The department uses this feedback to make future proposals regarding syllabi, curriculum to be changed if required. The changes suggested are put up before Board of Studies for discussion and approval of all members. The unanimous decision is then put up for approval in the academic council.

(b) Students or staff, curriculum as well as teaching-learning-evaluation and What is the response of the department to the same?

- The students are provided feedback performs to evaluate their mentors, give their comments and feedbacks about the teachers, curriculum and the constraints they are facing. The feedback is duly studied, and necessary steps are taken to address deficiencies/suggestions.
- Tutorials are also conducted from time to time to get feedback.

(c) Alumni and employers on the programmes and what is the response of the department to the same?

The alumni working in various capacities in state agricultural department, mandis, agro banks have been helpful in coordinating off campus training programmes of our students. Their positive suggestions are incorporated in the curriculum. Alumni occupying important positions give feedback on latest agricultural technologies and agronomic practices which are helpful to the faculty from time to time.

This is ensured through getting feedbacks from the students during tutorials groups and the same is discussed with the principal in a general meeting that follows. The constraints observed in the academics, curriculum, syllabi are also put forward by the students in the feedback performas. The constraints observed are identified and assessed so as to evolve effective programmes to overcome the barriers to better learning outcomes.

35. Highlight the participation of students and faculty in extension activities.

- The participation of students in Agents of Change programme (Ist Phase-2015-16) is one such endeavour. The programme conceptualized by Columbia Water Centre (US) with a joint initiative with P.G. Department. Of Agriculture, Khalsa College assumes significance in times when the state agriculture is in grave crisis owing to depleting water resources and deterioration of soil and human health. The programme has been a great success and became popular with the students who were engaged in interacting with farmers of 65 villages in their district. They disseminated information through web portal and mobile applications containing useful information on crop production, weather and marketing of major agricultural crops .These applications were installed by the student on the mobile phones of the farmers for their use. They also guided farmers how to use these applications for better agriculture.
- CIPT which is India office of Columbia water center with the students of the department will test the data collecting ability of a drone prototype and its usefulness during the next course of Agents of Change programme. This low cost drone prototype known as Quad copter will be developed by CIPT for the purchase by farmers in years to come was introduced during formally launching of the programme. The device was flown over the agricultural fields on the campus to know the moisture contents in the soil as well as health of the crop.

The department arranged following training programmes for B.Sc. VII and VIII semester elective groups:

- One week Bee Keeping training
- One week training on extension services offered by various agencies: Chief Agriculture Officer; Dy. Director Horticulture; MARKFED and IFFCO.
- One week training in various rural and State Cooperative banks to study various services provided by banks to the farmers.
- A visit to Grain market, Batala to acquaint the students with marketing services provided by the state and problems faced by the farmers in marketing the produce.
- One week training of horticulture on orchard management schedules (hoeing, weeding, pruning of Kinnow and peach orchard), planting and cutting of varieties of plum, lay out of the field and planting of the cuttings.
- Two days training on production of button mushrooms and dhingri was impacted by producers in Dehriwal Mushroom Farms (Jandiala block).
- Visit to Government Nursery & Orchard, Attari, Centre of Excellence, Kartarpur and Fruit Research Station, Jallowal.
- One month training on 'Role of plant quarantine in Bio security at Regional Plant Quarantine Statio.

- Visit to Integrated Check Post, Attari. For acquaintaince with role played by ICP in preventing the entry of quarantine pests into India.
- Visit to "Bhagat Puran Singh Natural Agricultural Farm, Manawala" to learn about the agronomic practices followed at the farm and different organic ways of cultivation of field crops and pest controls.
- A week long training on processing and canning of fruits at Khalsa College Canning Centre by Ms Harpreet Kaur, HDO, Dept of Agriculture, Punjab 2016-17(October).
- A week long training at Dehriwal (one of the largest mushroom growing areas of Punjab), district Amritsar on Mushroom cultivation (OCTOBER).
- As part of the Agents of Change programme (II_{nd} phase) was conducted from 15.10.16 24.10 16, field visits were organized in which sixteen teams of ten students each from the department visited villages of Amritsar district and interacted with the farmers The students gathered information about the challenges being faced by the farmers and the agriculture sector. During the visits, students used an ' educative cum entertainment' approach to interact with the farmers. For this, they used an informative floor game designed by CIPT. The game is an adaptation from the Indian traditional game Saanp Seedhi (Snakes and ladders) conceived by CIPT. The key objective of this game is to build knowledge among farmers on water conservation, sustainable farming and crop management related topics through gaming methodology.

A detailed research is carried out before initializing any academic programme. A team of senior faculty members is constituted to survey the academic and industry requirements of the new course. The committee explores the scope and utility of the program. Thereafter, syllabus for the course is designed and put to the Board of Studies for discussions and modifications. After clearance from the Board of studies the program proposal is forwarded to Academic Council and then to the Governing council for clearance.

(a) Faculty on curriculum as well as teaching-learning-evaluation? If yes, how does the department utilize it?

The department obtains feedback from faculty regarding the course curriculum design and teaching-learning-evaluation. The senior faculty members scrutinize the information obtained and based on that subject seminars, expert lectures and workshops are organized. This is also utilized for the development of the syllabi and other academic/extra-curricular activities. Apart from the fortnightly and monthly tests (both written and oral) quizzes and student seminars are organized to interpret the level of information passed to the students.

(b) Student on staff, curriculum as well as teaching-learning-evaluation and what is the response of the department for the same?

The student feedback on the staff, curriculum as well as teaching-learningevaluation is obtained by HoD through interactions with students and through tutorial groups at the college level. Tutorial groups are organized wherein the faculty of other streams interacts with the students to understand their difficulties and requirements. The information obtained from all the tutorial groups is summarized and passed to different departments for necessary actions.

(c) Alumni and employers on the programmes and what is the response of the department for the same?

The feedback from alumni of the department is obtained during the alumni meet. The valuable suggestions from alumni members are utilized for the development of the department. The industrial tours are organized form time to time and suggestions of the industry are also considered for the development of the department.

33. List the teaching methods adopted by the faculty for different programmes:

For BPT

• Apart from the basic black board teaching method, practical demonstration is used to clear the concepts. The faculty of the department is effectively using the modern A-V aids to impart knowledge to the pupils as per the

requirement of the course. Students are exposed to real life patient cases, assessment, treatment and various surgical procedures through videos on the LCD projector.

- Teaching through real life implementation of the theoretical theories to the patients in department OPD, where the students get a chance to better understand the signs and symptoms of various diseases and apply various electrotherapeutic modalities to the real cases. The patient cases are later discussed through class presentations.
- **Hospital teaching:** The department has collaboration with renowned hospitals of Amritsar. The students of 3rd and 4th year are imparted practical training under the supervision of teachers. They are taken to these hospitals accompanied by the teachers daily for two hours, where they are exposed to the working of different departments to get familiar with the instruments and equipments used in hospitals, different patient cases and situations as well as medical ethics.
- **Field Teaching:** The students are exposed to field teaching, under the guidance of teachers, the final year students visit the people of with different occupations to find out the physical problems related to their occupation. This information collected is then shared with the students in the class lectures to make them aware of various physical problems related to different professions.

For MPT

- Power point presentations and over-head projectors are used in routine teaching.
- The cases of hospitalized patients are discussed in class through presentations. Students are exposed to real life patient cases, assessment, treatment and various surgical procedures through videos on the LCD projector.
- Recent researches in the field of Physiotherapy are discussed through 'Journal Presentations' every week.
- **Hospital teaching:** Students are exposed to live cardiopulmonary surgeries in the hospitals. The department has collaboration with renowned hospitals of Amritsar for this purpose. They visit these hospitals two days a week, where they are exposed to the working of ICU, wards and operation theatre to become familiar with the instruments, procedures, equipments, different patient cases, in-ward emergencies/situations and medical ethics.

34. How does the department ensure that programme objectives are constantly met and the learning outcomes monitored?

- The academic performance of the students is monitored weekly through regular class tests and assignments by the teacher.
- Head of the department has direct interaction with the students to know the difficulties and constraints faced by them.
- Regular departmental meeting are held to discuss learning outcomes and to find out the probable solutions for the difficulties faced.

• In order to meet the objectives of the course, the students are regularly taken to the renowned hospitals for real life clinical exposure.

In the camp, 104 patients were assessed for BMD levels and free calcium supplements were distributed. The BMD testing equipment was provided by 'Keen Health Care Pvt. Ltd.' 2012-Extension Lecture An extension lecture was organized by 'Physio Club' on Disaster management in the college seminar hall on 22nd February, 2013. The 2013 on Disaster lecture was delivered by Mr. Surjit Sharma, Deputy Chief Warden, Civil Management Defense, Amritsar, who spoke on the issue of natural and man-made disasters and their prevention and management. The department organized a seminar on cardiopulmonary Resuscitation' on 2013-Seminar on 23rd October, 2013 at the department for all BPT students. Mr. Ranbir 2014 Cardiopulmonary Singh, Vice Secretary, Red Cross Society, Amritsar delivered a detailed Resuscitation. lecture on CPR along with practical demonstration. 2014-Seminar on Recent A seminar on 'Recent Advancements in Knee Replacement' was organized by the department for the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college on 2015 Advancements in Knee Replacement 23rd September, 2014 at seminar hall. Dr. Avtar Singh, Chief Orthopedic surgeon and Head of Orthopedics Department, Amandeep Hospital, Amritsar made the staff aware about the new techniques in the knee joint replacement, its recovery, rehabilitation and outcomes as well as expenditure. 

Kindly ask the Principal(s) of the College(s) to send a Certificate to UGC that the data provided by them in the proposal were factually correct. Kindly inform the college(s) that if the data submitted by the college(s) are found to be incorrect, the CPE status would be revoked, as per the provision in the Guidelines on CPE.

The CPE tenure is for three years from the date of approval of the Budget of the colleges. You may request the college(s) to prepare an Action Plan for the years 2006-2007, 2007-2008, 2008-2009 and send the same to me along with the budgetary requirements in accordance with the CPE Guidelines, a copy of which has already sent to you and also available on our website. The colleges would be allotted the entire allocation as specified in the Guidelines for the period of three years. An advance grant of 50% of the allocation is being released separately.

Some time during May/June 2006, the Principals of the colleges will be required to make a presentation about their Action Plan before an Expert Committee at UGC office, New Delhi. Further details will be sent to the college(s) in due course.

Draft Report of the Peer team on Institutional Accreditation of Khalsa College, Amritsar Punjab

Section 1 : Preface

The Khalsa College, Amritsar volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), by presenting a self study report. A peer team consisting of Prof. K L Kamal, former Vice-Chancellor University of Rajasthan as Chairperson, Prof. H K Bajaj, Ch. Charan Singh Haryana Agricultural University, Hisar, Dr K K Tandon, Deputy Director (Colleges), Office of Higher Education Commissioner, Governement of Haryana and Dr Usha Mukundan, Vice Principal, Ramniranjan Jhunjhunwala College, Mumbai as members was constituted by the Council to visit the institution and validate the self study report. The team visited the institution for three days from 16th July to 18th, July, 2003. Dr Latha Pillai coordinated the visit on behalf of the NAAC.

The Khalsa College, affiliated to the Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar was established in 1892. It has an impressive heritage building situated in a beautiful campus covering a total area of 300 acres. The student strength of the college is 3581 of which 2176 are in undergraduate courses, 636 in postgraduate courses, 120 in PG diploma and 649 in self financing courses. The college offers 32 academic programs of which 16 are undergraduate, one certificate course, 02 PG Diploma, 14 postgraduate programs. The institution has UGC recognition under sections 2f and 12B. The college has a qualified teaching faculty strength of 135. There are 140 members on the non-teaching staff. The college is having 17 teaching departments. These are Physics, 'Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Computer Science, English, Economics, Political Science, Public Administration, Punjabi, History, Hindi, Physical Education & Divinity, Commerce, Agriculture, Food and Science & Technology and Physiotherapy.

The peer team carefully perused and analyzed the self-study report submitted by the institution. During institutional visit, the team went through all the relevant documents, visited the departments and the facilities, and interacted with the various constituents of the institution. The academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and extension facilities of the institution were seen. The peer team also interacted at length with the Governing Body, Head of the institution, faculty, non-teaching staff, students, parents and alumni of the institution. Based on the above exercise, and keeping in mind the criteria identified by NAAC, the peer team has made the assessment of the institution in totality.

SECTION II : CRITERION- WISE ANALYSIS

CRITERION 1 : CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Khalsa College, Amritsar, affiliate of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar is a co-educational College, established in March, 1892. The Guru Nanak Dev University Act does not provide for an autonomous status. Hence it follows the courses of study

designed by the University and annual system of academic work. Ever since its inception, the College has been taking lead in starting new courses in Humanities, Agriculture, Commerce, Science and Technology. It has been updating its teaching programme, adding vocational courses, keeping in mind the cherished goal of its founding fathers. The College offers 32 programmes: 16 U.G. Programmes, 14 P.G. Programmes and 02 P.G. Diplomas. The programmes include 9 vocational courses catering to the modern societal needs. However, the wide choice of subjects in elective subjects and non core options are marginally limited because the syllabi have to be followed rigidly. In vocational courses more than 50% students are female and male students dominate in UG courses but in P.G. Diploma and P.G. Classes female students outnumber the male students.. The College runs P.G. Diploma in Computer Application and P.G. Diploma in E-Commerce, Department of Agriculture, Department of Food Science Technology and Department of Physiotherapy are the unique features of this College. The College also provides a number of support services to farmers, villagers and the community at a large. Since its inception the mission of the College has been to provide higher education. Within this frame work the College has re-formulated its goals and objectives for 21" century with focus on transformative education in the context of globalization. The College strives to achieve excellence in education. The College has introduced a number of employment oriented courses during the last decade. A large number of elective options are offered as per university norms.

The department of Agriculture has done a commendable job in the past. Keeping in view the changing agriculture scenario, it is felt that the college may approach the University for updating U.G. & P.G. curriculum in light of recommendations and policies of Indian Council of Agricultural Research.

CRITERION II : Teaching- Learning and Evaluation.

The students are admitted on the basis of academic record and special entrance tests. The U.G. students are placed in groups on the basis of performance in class tests, assignments and house tests. Special arrangements for sports and athletes are made. They are also given financial assistance. There is Scholars' club and toppers from all classes are its members.

At the beginning of the academic session schedule of work for the session is prepared and maintained by each staff member, reviewed by Head of the Department and Principal. The syllabi is unitized term-wise and periodic review ensures that syllabus is covered as per plan. The internal assessment ensures that the regular teaching takes place. Besides lecture method, there is interactive learning through discussion sessions, group work and audio-visual methods. There exists central media facility to prepare audio visuals and other teaching aids. The students are taken to field trips and museums. This enables the students to communicate the knowledge acquired through books by real life experience. Attendance is taken to ensure commitment among students. Class room tests are regular feature. Record of attendance of students and house tests results are communicated to the students. The parents are also informed about attendance and results of students. The students are provided necessary information about evaluation methods in the beginning of the academic session.

The College has freedom to employ ad-hoc staff. More than 20% teaching is done by temporary teachers. There is no system of students evaluating the teachers nor an institutional mechanism for appraisal of teachers. Seminars, workshops, conferences are organized for students and faculty. Lecturers are encouraged to undertake research leading to PhD Degree. Financial assistance is also provided for Research Projects. College has 139 permanent faculty members and 35 ad-hoc teachers; 55 Ph.D., 24 M.Phil and 46 Post Graduate. Around 25% of the staff is engaged actively in research. The College claimed that Department of Agriculture has played a significant role in bringing green revolution in Punjab. A large number of agriculture scientists and sportsmen have risen to key positions at national and international level. The Institution has a well conceived plan for monitoring students progress. Remedial classes for sportsmen and athletes are organized. The College has a Scholars' Club. The lecture method of teaching is supplemented by taking students for field trips and industrial visit. Some of the P.G. Departments have their own libraries. However the team feels that the ratio of permanent teachers to temporary teacher is 4:1. The College follows the UGC directive of 180 teaching days in its academic session. It is suggested that there can be a greater participation of teachers in seminars in view of the P.G. teaching. The College can think of augmenting courses in view of the growing service sector like B.Sc Food and textile, and IT courses. The College can organize computer training for teaching and nonteaching staff to make use of the available infrastructure. The lecture method of teaching could be supplemented with modern computer based teaching aids.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college does not offer research programme leading to M.Phil and Ph.D. except that 2 Ph.D. students are registered in Department of Agriculture. Students of M Sc Agriculture are required to submit dissertation in partial fulfilment for award of degree. The college may approach National Bureau of Plant Genetic Resources, New Delhi for getting the germplasm of the newly developed varieties registered. The research work done by this department is appreciated by the team. The Sikh History Department has made a major contribution in preserving and propagating the Sikh history. The library is extremely well maintained and the efforts taken by the Department has also been publishing books and the collections are being used by researcher in India and abroad. A number of teachers from the Department of Punjabi have also published books and articles.

The teachers are encouraged to undertake research. Few research projects are in progress. About 40% of the faculty have Doctorate and some of the teachers are engaged in research and publish research papers in journals, newspapers and also have published books. The teachers are also encouraged to do Ph.D. research work on part time basis. Some faculty members have been invited to present papers in seminars. However, there is need to motivate more teachers to take up research projects and attract funding from agencies like UGC, CSIR, DST, DBT and ICAR. This will not only enrich the faculty but will also be of immense help to the student community.

The College offers consultancy service to farmers and also runs a veterinary hospital. This effort is appreciated. The students and teachers undertake extension activities along with Government organizations as well as independently. There is scope for further utilization of students potential for extension activities and outreach program specially in food processing.

Department of Physiotherapy holds camps in villages on regular basis. The department provides free services to the locals and service to the community.

The college has four wings of the NCC which is involved in various extension programs. The students are motivated to join the defence services as a result the college has contributed richly to the defence services of the country.

Criterion IV- Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Since its inception in 1892 the college has continuously expanded its infrastructural facilities, multi-storeyed building, library, laboratories, staff quarters, Cricket grounds, swimming pool, etc. Vast and well maintained sports grounds and well developed lawns are the special features of the college campus. The college still intends to expand the physical infrastructure. The funds for the building have come from Management, UGC grants, donation, fees from Self Financing Courses. The managements provides funds for the maintenance of college building and grounds. There is a full time maintenance crew. It is worth appreciating that college has organized voluntary service (Kar Seva) for repairs. The academic facilities and that of the auditorium, cricket ground are also used by rotary club, schools and other organization in the area on nominal payment basis.

The campus is spread over 300 acres, is beautiful and surrounded by greenery. There is open excess system in library. Book bank facilities are also available for the needy. The computerization of library is in progress and provides reprography, computers, internet, and audio visual cassettes, cinema projector etc. Besides a central computer facility, 8 departments have computers of their own. The computers are maintained by the system administer. There is a common instruments room which is used by all the science departments. Sports club encourages and promotes sporting and athletic activities in the college. Free education, free hostel accommodation and free meals are given to sports persons. Scholarships are also available to outstanding sports persons. The college has two girls and 4 boys hostels with a capacity of about 225 students in each. The hostel inculcates cooperative living, team work and discipline. Accommodation is also available for teaching staff and there are 125 staff quarters. Some departments are connected with telephones. The college has health centre, testing lab for students and staff. Group insurance scheme for the staff has been in existence for the last 15 years and students have been covered under accidental insurance plan from the year 2003. Free education, hostel accommodation and free meals are given to sports persons. Scholarships are also available for outstanding sportspersons.

The college has an impressive participation of students at National & International level sports activities. It has a vast and well maintained play ground.

Criterion-V Student Support and Progression

Barring a few, the college has high percentage of passes including a number of ranks in the university examinations. Since the aim of the college is to impart modern education, from time to time new courses have been added. The college collects feed back informally from the students so as to improve academic atmosphere and infrastructural facilities. The college publishes an updated prospectus annually which keeps prospective students informed of various programmes offered by the college. Financial aid is provided to the needy as well as meritorious students worth an amount of Rs. 3.6 lacs. The teachers also guide the students about employment possibilities. The alumni of the college maintained an active link with their alma-meter. The college invites 8-10 distinguished old Khalsa College students and honours them every year. The old students association can play a major role in mobilizing resources. Extra-curricular and sports departments give ample support to students to develop their leadership and management skills. Adequate educational and leisure time facilities are available to students. They include indoor and out-door games, nature club, debate club, audio-video facilities, dance and music competition, workshop and other activities conducted by various clubs. These facilities need to be further strengthened in view of students demand.

The college has recently established a placement office. Its functions and working need to be formalized and strengthened. The college has a clear mission which is pursued vigorously and indication of this is the large number of eminent alumni to have contributed significantly at the National and International level. There is also a need for a formal counselling cell with a professional counselor. The college can organize career fairs which will benefit the students of this and nearby colleges.

Criterion VI Organisation and Management

Khalsa College is governed by Khalsa College Society. The governing council analyses the working of the college and provides directions for the long-term and shortterm activities for the college. Internal co-ordination and monitoring of the college is done by the Principal, Vice Principal, Registrar, Controller of Exams, Bursar, Deans and Heads of Departments. The college has an efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism. The office staff has been trained for the use of computers. It is suggested that the grievance redressal cell be formalized. Loans from CPF, banks and mutual aids funds are made available in times of need. There is an internal audit mechanism in the college. The college undertakes various welfare programmes for the community.

Criterion VII: Healthy Practices

The peer team has identified a few unique features which enhance the academic ambience of the institution. They are as follows:

- The college is one of the oldest in the country and has started self-financing courses in emerging areas for the students.
- Value based education is being imparted to the students.
- Excellence in sports.
- Service to Nation by motivating students to join defence forces.
- Group insurance for teaching and non teaching staff.
- The campus maintenance and discipline are praiseworthy.
- The college gives free education, lodging and boarding to meritorious sports persons which is highly appreciated.
- The college motivates students to participate in social services like organization of blood donation camps and free medical camps for the villagers

Section 3: Overall Analysis

The peer team, after going through the self-study report and after its visit to various academic and physical facilities, is very impressed by the progress of the Khalsa College in pursuing the projected goal of the institution. Khalsa College is a heritage institution having a huge campus and rich infrastructure facilities. The institution has great potential which needs to be developed in line with the global challenges.

The peer team considers that there are a number of features in the approach of Khalsa College towards quality assurance and standards which it commends and has

some suggestions which will further enhance the quality of education being imparted in this institution.

Inspite of all odds and challenges, turbulence on the border and in the State it is really commendable that this institution has maintained its secular character. The management is cooperative, the Principal is dynamic and the faculty is committed. It really augurs well that the management, College administration and the teachers are working with a sense of dedication and vision. The students are well- disciplined and feel happy in their surroundings. The parents also have appreciation for the College. Some of the departments are doing well but particular mention may be made of the Agriculture Department, Food Science & Technology, Extension Wing of Agriculture, Dairy. The Sikh History Research Centre has also preserved the valuable manuscripts. Achievements in the field of sports and games are really praiseworthy.

Suggestions :

- · Formal institutional mechanism be evolved to evaluate the faculty.
- Mechanism to get feed-back from the students be evolved and strengthened.
- Hindi Department remains neglected, serious efforts be made to popularize and develop the department.
- Each P.G. Department should have a departmental library and also computers.
- Girls should be encouraged to participate in sports, games, NCC and other activities and adequate facilities may be provided.

- Opportunities for students to develop in the area of Fine Arts may be given attention.
- Placement Cell seems which is in an infant stage, should be developed under the supervision of a permanent placement officer.
- An Advisory Bureau to help the students in choosing their career be established.
- Library should remain open for longer hours and more books particularly of latest editions be added.
- Since P.G. Departments have come into existence there is greater need of research. Serious efforts be made to promote fundamental and applied research in various departments.
- The College has rich infrastructure facilities to host national and even international seminars.
- The Staff Club should organize seminars, discussions on topics of mutual interest fortnightly.
- Extension lectures be organized.
- Faculty may be provided opportunity to attend National/International Seminars/Conferences for greater exposure.
- Efforts be made to start M.Phil classes, if rules permit.
- Inter-disciplinary academic activities be encouraged.

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There is need to encourage a teaching department for exploring possibilities of obtaining funds from UGC, ICSSR, ICHR, ICCR, DBT, DST and other funding agencies.

The peer team wishes the college all the best in its endeavor to become a Centre of excellence. The peer team places on record its appreciations, for the excellent cooperation, warmth and hospitality extended for the successful completion of its task by

the College authorities.


